The closing date for applications is 30th September 2021.

School terms in primary and post-primary schools

Schools in Ireland are obliged to open for 183 days per year at primary level and 167 days per year at post-primary level. At one time, schools had a good deal of flexibility about the start and end of school terms. This meant that there was considerable variation about when students returned to school after holidays such as Christmas and mid-term breaks.

Since 2004 school terms have been standardised under a series of agreements made between representatives of schools, teacher unions, parents' organisations and other relevant bodies.

The dates for the start and the end of the school year are not standardised so schools have some discretion about when students finish school in the summer and when they start school in the autumn. All schools are closed for July and most

(or all) of August. The dates for the Christmas, Easter and mid-term breaks are standardised.

At the start of the school year, parents/guardians will get a list of days that the school will be closed during the year, including holidays and training days for teachers. If there are other unexpected closures the school will let you know in advance.

The Department of Education circular 0005/2020 deals with the standardisation of the school years from 2020/21 to 2022/23. The circulars also provides guidance about how schools can make up any time that is lost due to unforeseen closures.

COVID-19 and school

You can find information about school during the COVID-19 on our website. The Department of Education also provides information about going to school during Covid 19.

Start and end of the school year

The dates for the start and the end of the school year at both primary and post-primary level are not fixed. However, due to the start of State exams, post-primary schools are usually not open after the Friday before the June public holiday (the first Monday in June) in any year. The school year generally starts in the week in which 1 September falls

Discretionary days

Every school must be open for a minimum of 183 days at primary level and 167 days at post-primary level. Schools can use any remaining days at their discretion to extend the summer holiday period or to close on religious or other holidays.

However, schools cannot use these days to extend the Christmas, Easter or mid-term breaks (unless a religious observance day(s) falls at that time for schools of a particular denomination or faith). If a school does not have enough discretionary days left for a religious holiday, it can denote that day a non-tuition day.

October 2021 mid-term break

All schools close from Monday 25 October 2021 to Friday 29 October 2021 inclusive.

Christmas 2021

All schools close on Wednesday 22 December 2021, which is the final day of the school term. All schools re-open on Thursday 6 January 2022.

Our churches are open for Public Masses. While number will continue to be restricted and social distancing enforced it does mean that in St Mary's we can have a maximum of 69 people in attendance for Masses.

There are 27 places on the individual chairs (11 as you enter from the porch, 12 at the Sacristy side and 4 at the front of the altar.) There are then 42 in the pews.

There can be no movement between these two areas. Each area will have separate entrances and exits.

Admission to all Masses will be on a first-comefirst-served basis. Enter at the main porch door, queueing from the left across the front of the old part of the church maintaining social distance at all times. We rely on your understanding to make this work. Masks must be worn.

Stewards Required:

As all Masses continue to be restricted. St. Mary's urgently require stewards to ensure that the guidelines are adhered to. If you would be willing to help, please contact Deirdre in the Parish Office. (01- 6217041) or by filling in the form online.

Private Prayer:



All eyes are on Rome...

This week the eyes of the world are focused on Rome. An unprecedented number of journalists from all parts of the world have converged there as Pope Francis convenes a summit of leaders of the Episcopal Conferences from around the world. All kinds of experts and pundits on child abuse have converged as bishops and cardinals assemble for what will undoubtedly be an important moment in church history. Pope Francis will speak twice at the meeting giving both the opening and closing address. Among the other speakers are Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle of Manila in the Philippines, Cardinal Rubén Salazar Gómez of Bogotà in Colombia, Cardinal Oswald Gracias of Mumbai in India, Cardinal Reinhard Marx of Munich in Germany, and Cardinal Blaise Cupich of Chicago – it could double as a list of possible future Popes when Pope Francis is called to God.

Archbishop Charles Scicluna of Malta is a leading expert in the field. At a press conference in Rome on Monday last, he stated that a primary aim of the meeting was to end the culture of denial that has dogged the whole issue, and to put an end to "complicity whether criminal or malicious, in all its forms."

What goes without saying is that the time for words has passed, action is now demanded if the church is to retain some modicum of credibility. This has to include a genuine "zero tolerance" policy regarding the crime of the sexual abuse of a minor ie. permanent removal from ministry for even one substantiated accusation. This "zero tolerance" must also extend to the cover up of such crimes of abuse, this doesn't mean the quiet stepping down of a bishop found guilty of such a cover up but the application of the same penalty as incurred by the abuser – removal from the clerical state.

It is clear that too many young lives have been blighted by the scourge of the sexual abuse of minors at the hands of those trusted as shepherds, this Roman meeting has to be a real turning point when a new mind-set puts the safety of children above all else, in a church where all clerical office is subservient to this primary consideration.

This meeting won't be judged on the quality of its speakers or the voluminous handouts to the world media who have gathered, but rather by a much simpler yardstick – one given us by Jesus himself: "By their fruits you shall know them." (Matthew 7:16)

Let's invoke the Holy Spirit to guide and direct all who gather this week, so much depends on it. Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful.

St. Mary's Camera Soirée

August did not turn out to be a particularly great month weather wise. I had to turn on the central heating a couple of nights! Our photographers were stymied on a couple of Friday mornings when they had to cancel their "field trips" because of the weather.

Two interesting ones this week are the photo of Frances's nephew on bee keeping duties, and the photo of the "Southern Cross" monument on Portmarnock Strand which was erected in 1999. The work was a collaboration between the artists Remoe De Fouw and Rachel Joynt and their title of this work is "Eccentric Orbit"

I didn't know that Portmarnock strand played an important role in the history of aviation. On 24th June 1930 this beach, known as the Velvet Strand, was used as a runway for the final leg of the first successful East-West circumnavigation of the earth by aircraft.

After a flight from Portmarnock lasting about 32 hours the 'Southern Cross' aircraft (*pictured below*), a Fokker F.VII/3m monoplane, piloted by Australian Charles Kingsford Smith landed at Harbour Grace, Newfoundland. The "Southern Cross" then continued to

Oakland, California, from where the journey had begun on 31st May 1928!

February 2022 mid-term break: Primary schools close for 2 days, on Thursday 24 February 2022 and Friday 25 February 2022. Primary schools may use 3 discretionary days to extend this to a 5-day break starting on Monday 21 February 2022 unless they need these days to make up for time lost due to unforeseen school closures.

Post-primary schools close for a week, from Monday 21 February 2022 to Friday 25 February 2022 inclusive, unless changes are needed to make up for time lost due to unforeseen school closures.

If a post-primary school needs to make up such time, it may shorten the mid-term break by staying open up to and including Wednesday 23 February 2022.

Easter 2022: All schools close on Friday 8 April 2022, which is the final day of the school term, unless changes are needed to make up for time lost due to unforeseen school closures. If a school needs to make up such time, it may shorten the Easter break by staying open up to and including Wednesday 13 April 2022.

All schools re-open on Monday 25 April 2022

The Retreat

Another event that was very special to village life was the annual retreat. The retreat lasted for two weeks, the first week for the women of the parish, the second for the men. Mass was at 6am and the evening sermon at 8pm.

One never knew in advance the subject matter of the following night, with one exception, the night the sermon was to be on 'company keeping'. With that subject you were given prior notice.

As Lucan was a very rural area in those days, most of the courting was done in gateways, which at the time were very numerous around the village. Prior to the opening of the retreat it was not uncommon for Fr. Hooke and the Missioner to do a walk around the known courting posts late at evening. I recall this advice being handed down from the pulpit from a Jesuit Missioner during his sermon on company keeping, "Men, if you have to do your courting in gateways, the correct position to adapt for this purpose is for the man to stand on one side of the gate and the young lady to stand on the other side, and on no account should the man allow the raging lion out of his cage!"

The missions were usually given by the Jesuits or the Dominicans. They used different techniques to spell out their message. The Dominicans would pace up and down in front of the altar as they delivered their sermon, the Jesuits would deliver their sermons from the pulpit. The Jesuits were well known for their fire and brimstone sermons, and they had their audience trembling in their seats. Their last dramatic gesture would be to thump the cushion that covered the top of the pulpit. What the Missioner was not aware of was that Little Joe who cleaned the church was unable to reach up that high to clean the cushion and the result was that at the dramatic climax of his sermon, the Missioner was enveloped in a cloud of dust, which caused him to break into a fit of coughing and sneezing, and the sermon somewhat lost the impact the Missioner had been building up to.

The memories are from a time when people 'knew their place' in society, when the church and the long arm of the law were in charge!

And people didn't really mind – it was the norm back then!

The Laundry Hole

A little gem hidden well away from the public is The Laundry Hole – a place frequented by local fishermen – along the Liffey behind the boys' school.

The name arises because St. Edmundsbury Hospital had a Laundry House along here, to which water from the river was pumped. A horse and cart would bring the dirty laundry from the hospital, where it would be washed in Liffey water. Some



ruins remain including the gully along which the water ran to the laundry house.
