



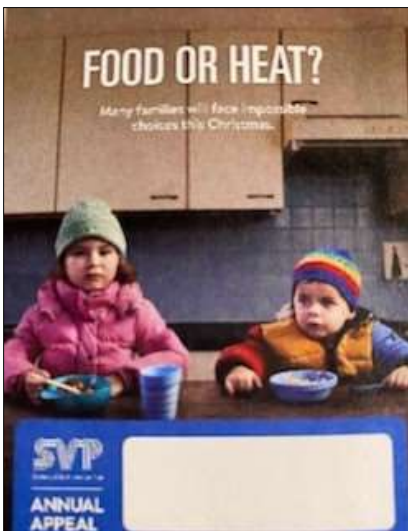

What is Fuel Allowance?

Fuel Allowance is a payment to help with the cost of heating your home during the winter months. Many people getting a social welfare payment will qualify for the Fuel Allowance.

The Fuel Allowance season normally begins in late September of each year and ends in April.

2022-2023 Fuel Allowance season

Fuel Allowance will be paid from the week starting Monday, 26 September 2022. It will be paid for 28 weeks.

The current rate of Fuel Allowance is €33.

If you qualify for the allowance, it is paid with your social welfare payment on the same day.

You can choose to get the Fuel Allowance paid weekly or paid in 2 lump sums.

Budget 2023: Fuel Allowance

From January 2023, the following changes will apply to how income is assessed in the means test for Fuel Allowance:

Disablement Benefit and half-rate Carer's Allowance will be disregarded in the means test for Fuel Allowance.

People aged 70 and over do not need to be getting a qualifying social welfare payment. Capital (savings and investments) not taken into account in the means test will increase from €20,000 to €50,000. They can have a weekly means (which includes their State Pension) up to €500 per week for a single person and €1,000 per week for a couple. In the case of a couple, only the person applying for the allowance needs to be aged 70 or over.

For people aged under 70, the weekly allowable means above the applicable State Pension (Contributory) rate will increase from €120 to €200.

How your income is assessed for Fuel Allowance

Fuel Allowance is a means-tested payment. In a means test, the Department of Social Protection (DSP) examines all your sources of income – find out more about 'what is included on the means test' on our website. Your **gross** weekly income must be below a certain amount to pass the means test.

You are usually accepted as passing the means test for Fuel Allowance, if you are already getting a qualifying social assistance payment.

The amount of means that you are allowed to have for Fuel Allowance is the current maximum rate of State Pension (Contributory) including any increases that you might get for your age, living alone and dependants, plus €120.

For example:

The assessable income limit for a single person under 80 is €373.30 (€120 plus €253.30)

The assessable income limit for a couple (where the qualified adult is aged under 66) is €542 (€120 plus €253.30 plus €168.70)

The assessable income limit for a couple (where the qualified adult is aged 66 or over) is €600.30 (€120 plus €253.30 plus €227)

If you are over 80, add an extra €10 to the appropriate DSP payment rate.

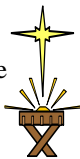

Come the first of December our thoughts are drawn to Christmas. As festive lights begin to twinkle and shine throughout our community, our hearts are warmed as we look forward to sharing this special time with family and friends.

Anticipation is especially heightened this year as, following a two year break, many of our much missed Pre Christmas traditions have returned. Not least of which being the Annual Transition Year Musical at St Joseph's College.

This year's production, 'Guys and Dolls', opened on Thursday 1st of December. As I made my way to the show I found myself reminiscing about its predecessors – 'All Shook Up', 'Calamity Jane', 'The Music Man', to name but a few. It is hard to believe that this annual production, a runaway success, is in its 35th year!

An Impressive new tiered seating and a minimalist stage awaits. The lights dim and the audience is whisked back in time to the bygone days of New York City. Through music, song and dance we are brought on a journey from the bustle of time square to the dance clubs of Havana to the slums of New York. This romantic comedy has quite a tale to tell which a con man, a high-rolling gambler, a show girl and a puritanical missionary and a multitude of other similarly diverse characters play out.

The first act opens with a colourful trio, 'Nicely-Nicely Johnson', 'Benny Southstreet' and 'Rusty Charlie'. These dapperly turned out 'Guys' (top marks to the wardrobe dept!) are one of the many sets of characters who provide a kaleidoscope of colour, glamour and depth to the storyline.

Others include the amazing Hot Box Dancers, the 'down and dirty' Crapshooters and of course the besieged Mission Band members.

Nathan Detroit (a superb performance by Melissa Wogu) takes the stage as a con man trying to fund his illegal crap game. He sees the high-rolling Sky Masterson (perfected by Hazel Gogarty) as an opportunity and proposes a bet he doesn't think he can lose - that Sky cannot take a 'Doll' he nominates to dinner in Havana - namely the missionary Sarah Brown (Juleanne Cruz, who has the voice of an angel). This dastardly wager is set against Nathan's own troubled relationship with

Miss Adelaide (an outstanding performance by Aoife Gorman) who, following a fourteen-year engagement, wants her man to stay on the straight and narrow and to marry her. Redemption follows and ultimately love wins the day.

'Guys and Dolls' was a delight from start to finish. The choreography was simply stunning and all-time favourites scores including 'Luck be a Lady' and 'Sit down, you're rocking' the boat' all but brought the house down. With talent matched only by enthusiasm, it was the performance of a lifetime. Bravo to all those involved, take a bow, you deserve it!

On a personal note, I would like to thank Catherine Bligh, Deputy Principal, for including a tribute to my late Father, Ewan O' Flynn, in this year's programme. It was a very thoughtful gesture. Ewan always looked forward to the Annual Musical at St Josephs and would have thoroughly enjoyed 'Guys and Dolls'.

Lucan Planning Council

Lucan Planning Council will hold a public meeting on Saturday 17th December at 11.30 AM outside the Spar shop, Dodsboro.

So far, we had little success in our efforts to restore route 25. Dodsboro and surrounding estates are growing older, and the 25-bus route is needed now more than ever. No success either in restoring the Blanchardstown hospital bus to Arthur Griffith Park, Lucan South, and the extra stop into the hospital.



The NTA so far, have refused to meet us and replies we received show they don't understand the concerns of local users. Elderly, users with a disability and women with children are hit the hardest. The pattern of refusing to meet local communities is repeated elsewhere too.

Our efforts will continue with your support to have these problems addressed.

We know you won't let us down and you will come out in numbers like last year for just for one half hour, to agree the way forward. Most problems are solved by talking, we need to persuade the NTA of that.

They teased us somewhat by bringing route C2 down towards Dodsboro and then a massive detour round South Lucan. The people of Shackleton are not happy with this long detour either.

New systems can have teething problems, but no real response after twelve months shows they are not taking this problem seriously. Route 25 is vital for more than Lucan: passengers for Lucan coming from the city are filling seats on the Maynooth and Celbridge routes resulting in people from these areas being left behind. Lucan passengers are also left behind at times on Lucan main road through the village when Maynooth buses are filled.

We welcome the good points in Bus Connects but restoring route 25 addresses most of these contentious problems and placing more buses on the C2 route does not address the issues. Lucan is not being served, and the NTA must service the needs west of Woodies junction; the People of Lucan deserve better.

Please join us briefly on the 17th, we know for a fact that Leixlip is getting the cold shoulder too from the NTA. We must stand together.

WORLD CUP FEVER

I'm weird. At least that's what I was told when I said, "Sunday Miscellany was cancelled for a *&@!^%\$#@!! Rugby Match." Professor Brendan Kennelly said: "You can overcome a bad marriage, you can grapple with and overcome alcoholism, but you'll never get over losing an All-Ireland Final. But many literary figures, great thinkers and philosophers down through the centuries would argue that sport is not that important. Patrick Kavanagh reminded us that " . . . in Ulysses, only the punter speculating on the result of the Ascot Gold Cup comes into the theme. So sport can't have been very vital.

While Kipling's advice to competitors would be to; "...treat those two impostors just the same" he referred to "... the flannelled fools at the wickets or the muddied oafs at the goals". So he mustn't have considered a love of balls to be indicative of much upstairs. Arthur Conan Doyle's had Sherlock Holmes confess that; "My ramifications stretch into many sections of society, but never, I am happy to say into sport". George Orwell saw sport as having nothing to do with fair play but: "... bound up with hatred, jealousy, boastfulness and disregard for all rules". R.S. Surtees spoke of sport as "... the image of war without the guilt".

Apologies for quoting a person who worked in a Bank but T.S. Eliot felt sorry for anyone whose only monument was, ". . . the asphalt road and a thousand lost golf balls." So, is sport that important? The adult hurling season concluded on Saturday with our Under 21A hurlers winning the 'B' Championship final after an epic tussle with Commercials. This was the third championship win of the year for the adult hurling section (along with U19A and U17B), following three league successes (Senior, Junior A and U17A) earlier in the year, in what was a very successful season overall. Four points down and a man down, as the clock approached 60 minutes and things didn't look good for Lucan's chances. However, the lads didn't give up and 4 successive points, three of them in injury time, brought the game to extra time, and ultimate victory for Lucan. The sides had been quite evenly matched from the outset and were level at 0-5 each after the opening 15 minutes. A goal, well finished by Sean Harkness in the 16th minute, gave Lucan the advantage but Commercials quickly clawed that back and there was only a point between them at half time, 1-9 to 0-11. Lucan generally had the better of the exchanges in the first half but were less efficient in scoring and clocked up a lot of wides. The sides were level by the 40th minute, 1-11 to 0-14 and still deadlocked at 1-13 to 0-16 entering the final 10 minutes. Lucan were down to 14 at that stage as Charlie Keher saw red for a mistimed shoulder. Commercials looked to have made a decisive surge when they got four points in a row to lead 0-20 to 1-13 into the closing stages. But Lucan showed remarkable resolve, aided by some fresh legs from the bench, to finish strong and level the game at 1-17 to 0-20 and force extra time. It had been a very entertaining hour of hurling and the prospect of more didn't disappoint the spectators despite the winter chill in the air. Lucan continued the momentum from the final minutes of normal time to establish superiority in the first period of extra time and led by three at the break, 1-22 to 0-22. Commercials



fought hard in the second period and closed the gap on occasion but Lucan held on to win by 4 points in the end, 1-26 to 0-25 in what was an epic encounter.

The contribution from the bench was very significant for Lucan with all six players introduced making an impact and showed the strength in depth of the panel. This was a very young U21 team with only one player not eligible for next year and three U17s entering the fray also. It was a great performance for such a young team at this level and there were leaders throughout the field with notable performances from Michael Cunningham, Colm Walsh and Jack Behan in defence and Matt Coogan, Sean Harkness and Evin Dowling upfront. This win is further evidence of the healthy pipeline of talent coming into the adult ranks, building on the successes at U19 and U17 level this year also.

St. Mary's Camera Soirée

This week Frances has submitted photos of the Christmas lights in Hillcrest. Conor submitted photos of a Heron at Malahide estuary, a blue tit and some late Autumnal colours.

Donal visited the National Museum Decorative Arts and History Division at Collins Barracks and Dublin Castle. One of the photos from Collins Barracks is of the Asgard yacht which is on display there. The yacht is most noted for her involvement in the Howth Gun-Running of 1914. In relation to Collins Barracks itself it is worth noting that 100 years ago on 17th of December 1922, General Sir Nevil Macready of the British Army handed over the Royal Barracks (one of the oldest military barracks in the world) to the Commander-in-Chief of the National Army of the Irish Free State General Richard Mulcahy. It was immediately renamed in honour of Mulcahy's predecessor Michael Collins.

One of Donal's photos from Dublin Castle is of the Bedford Tower from where the Irish Crown Jewels consisting of 394 precious stones were discovered to be missing in July 1907. They were never recovered. The story around the security, or lack of, of the crown jewels in the Bedford Tower leaves Faulty Towers in the halfpenny place!
