What Happens When One Stands Apart from the Crowd?!

It was refreshing to see Ireland and RTE standing away from the Eurovision on foot of the watery, valueless revision of standards by the Eurovision committee. Did the sky fall down on Ireland! No, nor on the other countries concerned! It is notable that all with insight into

the Eurovision workings see this not just as a stance for right and justice now, but as a fundamental shift in the whole system. It seems that everything about the Eurovision changes in this moment from a projection that it is apolitical and value free to a recognition that every declared value stance shakes not just the body taking the stance, but effects all in the system.



This is enormously refreshing in current times when the sheep mentality massaged into a vein of perceived necessity by the engines of social media like anaesthesia, needs a chain to break so that each person stands tall in their own space. The pace of cultural and societal change is more than most can take, but we need to catch up before the changes that we least desire for yourselves, our families and our communities leave us with a people that look like they have come off a production line!

We need to look at our own individual purpose of life, at where we get the energy to drive our most fundamental values and how our actions and choices need to reflect this. What are our core beliefs? What are our core values? What matters most? What is our life about? What is the purpose of everything we do? Do we recognise and acknowledge a higher power or some other enduring purpose? What do we fall back on if health/relationships/work....collapses? What do our practices and our priorities reflect in weekly action?

As the Irish Eurovision committee stepped off the line of treadmills without knowing what the impact might be, it is a good lead for us individually also. The rituals, practices and activities that make up the fabric of our societal treadmills might not be the right ones for us as individuals or families either. Open conversation and open minds lead to creating a tapestry of life to which we can honestly add our names! We don't all need to look the same!

What is Carer's Allowance?

Carer's Allowance is a weekly social welfare payment to people who care for someone because of their: Age, Disability, or Illness (including mental illness).

To qualify for the payment, your income must be below a certain amount.

If you care for 2 or more people, your rate of Carer's Allowance is increased by 50% (maximum) each week.

If you get another social welfare payment, you may get half-rate Carer's Allowance.

Budget 2026

From January 2026, the maximum weekly personal rate of Carer's Allowance will increase by €10 to €270 per week and €308 if carer is 66 or over.

From January 2026, the Child Support Payment will increase:

By $\[\]$ 8, from $\[\]$ 50 to $\[\]$ 58, for children under 12 years of age

By €16, from €62 to €78, for children aged 12 years and over

From July 2026, the weekly income disregard for Carer's Allowance will increase by \in 375 to \in 1,000 for a single person, and by \in 750 to \in 2,000 for a couple.

Carer's Support Grant

If you get Carer's Allowance, you automatically get Carer's Support Grant in June each year.

Other supports for carers

If you get Carer's Allowance, you can also get:

GP visit card Free Travel

Household Benefits Package (if you live with the person you care for)

Fuel Allowance (you need to meet the criteria for Fuel Allowance, including the Fuel Allowance means test)

Can I get Carer's Allowance?

You can get Carer's Allowance if you care fulltime for someone who is:

Aged 16 or over, and who is so incapacitated that they need full-time care and attention for at least 12 months, or

Aged under 16, and for whom you get

Domiciliary Care Allowance.

You can read 'What counts as full-time care' on our website.

As well as providing full-time care, you must:

Be aged 18 or over

Be habitually resident in Ireland

Not be employed, self-employed, doing voluntary work, training, or any education courses for more than 18.5 hours a week

Not live in a hospital, convalescent home, or a similar institution

Pass a means test

Care-sharing

You can share your caring responsibilities with another carer, where you each care for the person on a part-time basis.

You both must provide care from Monday to Sunday, but on alternate weeks. By law, anyone providing full-time care on a part-time basis must do so for a complete week (Monday to Sunday). You must meet all the usual qualifying conditions for Carer's Allowance.

In this case, you and the second carer share: A single Carer's Allowance payment, and The annual Carer's Support Grant. You each get Free Travel.



If anyone has this growing in their garden they should keep an eye on it in January, as it is often visited by Cedar Waxwings, a really striking migrant bird which often arrives here in flocks from Scandinavia and Siberia. The red berries of plants such as Hawthorn and Mountain Ash are particular favourites of the Waxwing.

Bird watchers and wildlife photographers will travel long distances if they hear reports of the presence of Waxwings. The attached photo was taken by one such photographer in Lucan a number of years ago.

Medjugorje Pilgrimage 2025

In October, a group from the Lucan parishes and elsewhere travelled to Medjugorje in Bosnia Herzegovina on pilgrimage with Marian Pilgrimages led by Pat Colgan.

Medjugorje is now one of the worlds most visited Marian shrines. Changes to County Development Plan: South Dublin County Council (SDCC) will publish proposed changes to the County Development Plan early in 2026, on direction of Government, to respond to the housing crisis. These proposals cover proposed rezoning.

What this means for you: When the proposed variation is published, the public will have a 4-week window to review the plans and make a submission. This is a crucial opportunity for you as residents & community groups to have your views formally included.

What happens next: 4 weeks for display & public submissions / prepare SDCC CE's Report 6 weeks for Councillors to consider CE Report Special Council meeting to decide on making, refusing or modifying the variations. Your submission will be an important part of this decision-making process. I will keep constituents informed.

Metro Dart

RTE prime time on Tuesday 2nd December 2025 on M50 traffic congestion exposed the main flaw in Metro link. There is no solution to the M50 congestion when the promotors admitted they had done all they could. The wonderful Metro Link underground would not be possible to solve it either at such a high cost. The users on this Metro Link are city centre bound, while almost all users on the M50 are not city bound, they are moving in another direction, so it is not a solution. Metro Dart overground mirrors M50 usage for the main purpose of reducing traffic congestion on M50, to take commuters direct to work on the outskirts and to the city centre and provide a direct link to the Airport for all areas of Ireland that has access to rail. Congestion on the M50 Is urgent and a solution is needed now; Metro Dart is that solution and can be done relatively quickly.
