Who Cares!

The topic of caring is very much in the news currently, from a number of aspects. People are now living longer and generally with good health due to better living standards and care of own wellbeing and health. However, most arrive at a point where some level of care is needed. Most, potentially, can live at home with support, retaining independence and quality of life. Many who would previously have been fully institutionalised on account of having physical and/or intellectual needs are now cared for part time or full time at home.

There are now a wide range of aids to support caring for people physically, emotionally and intellectually as many with needs and many who have cared for those with needs, have been instrumental in driving inventions. Our homes can be adapted to accommodate most needs and AI and IT products improve safety and security measures. Caring for people in the home should be much easier now. However, no amount of AI will ever compensate for people and for human contact.



For those who are carers and those for who are availing of care from loved ones, the feelings of guilt and of frustration are often like heavy paniers hanging over every effort. Those being cared for feel guilty for being a 'burden' on those caring and those caring often feel like they are not doing enough.

Frustration by either party can be immovable obstacles in particular encounters with one another and further derive guilt when aware that the best self didn't show up in a particular moment!

Carers spend hours each month listening to Greensleeves having pressed several numbers on

the phone to access services or information only to arrive twenty minutes later to be informed that the phone line is now closed due to lunchtime, or staff handover time, etc and then find that the same process will start all over tomorrow! Almost no one is provided with enough care to respond to basic care needs re morning showering, dressing or evening routine in reverse. On receipt of care hours, it is not unusual for an effort to reduce the hours to be suggested by the suppliers and then for it to occur regardless.

Many carers suffer from some of the following: back injury, torn tendons and muscles, general exhaustion and depression. Carers often neglect care of themselves as there is no alternative if they are to serve the needs of the aged or person with disability.

If you have not had the experience of being a carer what could you do:

1 LISTEN! Allow the carer to vent, or to be silent, or just be. Don't judge. If advice is not asked for, do not give it.

2 Lobby politicians for a response to home care needs so that the package can equal that provided for nursing home care. Ask carers and those needing care what it is that could bridge the gap if the will and resources were provided.

3 If you have time, let the carer know when you have time to spare and ask what/if they might like you to do for the carer or the one needing care.

4 When you meet the carer and person being cared for socially, give time firstly to the person being cared for as that is the object of the carer's endeavours.

The Irish Constitution

The Irish Constitution (or **Bunreacht na hÉireann**) was ratified by the Irish people in 1937. It is the fundamental law of the State.

Every part of the Constitution is set out in both the Irish and English languages. Article 8 states that the Irish language is the first official language and that the English language is recognised as a second official language.

The Constitution establishes the branches or organs of government, it establishes the courts and sets out how those institutions should be run. It also describes the fundamental rights of every Irish citizen.

The Constitution is also part of a wider human rights framework in Ireland. This refers to all legal and other human rights commitments made by Ireland, including treaties under the United Nations, the European Convention on Human Rights and the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union.

Amending the Constitution: The consent of the Irish people is needed before the Constitution can be amended. This means that amendments to the Constitution can only be made by way of a constitutional referendum. Up to 2023, 38 constitutional referendums had been held, of which 32 resulted in amendments to the Constitution. A list of the amending Acts is at the front of the Constitution published on irishstatutebook.ie.

If no petition challenging the result is presented to the High Court within 7 days of its publication, the certificate becomes final. The President will then sign the Bill to change the Constitution and the Constitution will be amended.

It has come to our attention that some people are driving, very dangerously through our church car park, taking a short cut to get down Chapel Hill. In the interest of Health and Safety, the barrier at the entrance to the carpark from Chapel Hill is closed permanently now.



This photo from 1963, believed to be from The Irish Press, shows Lucan of a different era – when the men met up before we had *Men's Sheds* perhaps!



Jack Murray was the Village Blacksmith, and his forge was on the Lock / Newcastle Road, part of the present Courtney's Pub. In his book, *Some Lucan Memories*, Kevin Murray, son of Jack, paints an image of the men gathering daily in the forge for a bit of heat and a catch-up, in the days before

his father retired from the trade.

The signpost shows distances in miles, and the poster at the end of the wall was advertising a dance to be held in St. Finian's Hall in Newcastle, in aid of Porterstown Scouts.

Banning Cars Going Through Dublin City Centre

This is useless if public transport is not in place. At the moment it is very



difficult to get through the city centre at peak times by car. They have already pushed the car problem to other streets, to the M50, if they push out anymore, the M50 will be choked with high risks of hold ups, delays or accidents etc. Let public transport work with a simple solution, the Quay Bus Contraflow Loop.

Contraflow is the most effective bus lane of all. its self-policies, it will operate better on the Ouays as there are no shops, stores, or other activities on the Quayside, with synchronised traffic lights it will work even better creating the train track effect, no delay. This system gives priority to cycling, makes cycling safe with no blind spots due to buses turning right. This plan reduces too many buses crossing Luas lines. Their plan will increase bus numbers on the Quays and on the Luas line in Nassau St by almost one thousand buses per day for no extra passengers, this will only choke the city with public transport vehicles. Cutting off the city centre for through traffic will have little effect. Many of them provide essential services that public transport is not ideal, such as Nurses, Doctors, Gardai, Bus drivers., emergencies (you can't always wait on an ambulance) and caring for people with disabilities. It will divide Dublin North and South.

Don't forget people in Dublin have cars too. Most of these movements are outside peak and are not a big problem. At the moment after all these years there is no solution for public transport in the city centre. Let's get together and solve these problems with this simple solution, Bus Contraflow on the Quays with other ideas for the benefit of all.

A dull overcast day, made slightly interesting by a blustery wind! In other words, it was a nice 11 degrees with a 34 km wind with us for the first few kilometres that turned into a gentle misery as we ran into the wind for the middle sections, and the Wind Tunnel at the end of the race. A large turnout of 1688, runners, gathered at the start line, some up from most in the middle and some die hard at the back, there were several pacers mixed in with us, and the pacers balloons were easy to see! A fantastic 33 Lucan Harriers arrived full of ambition for the race with a fantastic effort put in by one and all. The race started in the Oak Park business park across from Fresh today. As you can imagine, we were surprised and disappointed to see litter begin to appear again after the weekend. We wonder have you any suggestions as to how we can resolve this?




St. Mary's Camera Soirée

The Camera Soiree's photographic exhibition continues in Lucan Library until the end of February so if you are visiting the library don't miss it.

More of our members have been abroad in recent weeks and have submitted some very interesting photos. Two photos from Rome caught my attention particularly. The first is of the copula in the church of St. Agnes in Agone which faces onto the Piazza Navone. The church is on the site where St. Agnes was martyred at the age of 12 or 13 around 304AD. The word "Agone" in the name of the church does not refer to the martyrdom. "Piazza in



Agone" was the ancient name of Piazza Navone and comes from the Greek meaning "in the site of the Competitions".



Another photograph comes from the Vatican Museums and is of the sculpture entitled "Sphere within Sphere" designed by Arnaldo Pomodoro for the Vatican and installed in 1996. The piece is one of a series of similar works across the world, including one located in the grounds of Trinity College. Still in Rome and in keeping with our theme for the month we have an ancient building and a new mode of transport.





Moving to France we have a couple of great sunsets as well as the interior of the cathedral of St. John the Baptist, Perpignan, which was begun in 1324 and finished in 1509. It is described as a national monument of France but I have been unable to find a reference to it on the website of the Centre des Monuments Nationaux, the French government body responsible for such sites. That does not take away from its beauty!
