Trócaire is the Irish Church's development agency that works to support the most vulnerable and marginalized communities around the world, providing humanitarian aid, supporting sustainable development initiatives, and advocating for human rights and social justice. Founded in 1973 by the Irish Episcopal conference, Trócaire works with partners in over 20 countries in Africa, Asia, and Latin America.

Service is the State's money advice service, guiding people through dealing with problem debt for over 20 years. MABS phone service is open Monday to Friday 9 am to 8 pm on 0818 07 2000.

Electricity Smart Meters

Since 2019, ESB Networks has been fitting homes and businesses with smart meters. Smart meters are the next generation of electricity meters and it is planned that all homes in Ireland will be fitted with smart meters by the end of 2024.

Smart meters will automatically communicate your electricity usage to your supplier, so there will be no more estimated bills. You will also have more information on your electricity usage than is available from current meters.

It is planned to replace the oldest meters with the new smart meters. You can contact your electricity supplier or ESBN to apply for a prioritised installation. There is no upfront charge to have a smart meter installed.

How to use less electricity: You can save on your electricity bills by being more energy efficient. The Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) helps consumers to improve their energy efficiency. Get tips and advice on how to save energy on everything from heating, lighting, hot water, cooking, appliances and draughts. You can get an energy monitor to tell you how much electricity you are using in real time. Making small changes to be more energy efficient can help reduce your bills.

Energy Efficiency Grants: You may be entitled to a grant to upgrade your home energy system and improve the BER rating of your home. This will lower the amount of electricity that you use. There are also grants available for solar panels. Get more information on how to improve your energy efficiency and on the grants available from the SEAL.

Treatment Abroad Scheme (TAS)

How does the Treatment Abroad Scheme work?

If you are a public healthcare patient and require treatment that is not available to you in Ireland, you may be able to apply for the Treatment Abroad Scheme (TAS). This allows you to get the medical treatment in another country in the European Union (EU), the European Economic Area (the EEA also includes Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) or in Switzerland.

Before you travel for your treatment, the HSE must assess and approve your application.

If the treatment is available in Ireland you can access it abroad using the Cross-Border Healthcare Directive.

How to qualify for the Treatment Abroad

Scheme: You must be ordinarily resident in Ireland to qualify for the Treatment Abroad Scheme. This means you live in Ireland and intend to live here for at least one year.

The medical treatment you need must be either: Not available in Ireland or

Not available within the time normally necessary to get it in Ireland, taking into account your current health and the likely course of your condition or disease

You cannot refer yourself for TAS. Only a public hospital consultant based in Ireland can refer you for treatment abroad. A GP cannot refer you for this scheme.

How to apply for the Treatment Abroad

Scheme: You, and your referring consultant, must complete an E112 application form (pdf).

You must send this to the HSE TAS office with a copy of your referral letter from your consultant when applying.

You should apply early, as you will have to wait for the HSE to approve your treatment abroad before you travel.

In the E112 form, your consultant must confirm that:

They are the consultant that is currently treating you. They assessed you within a 2-week period before making an application to the HSE.

The application is based on their own medical opinion. A consultant cannot fill in a form at the request of another person.


The national Ireland Reads Day takes place on Saturday 25th February. In the lead up to this, Lucan Library has a Children's Competition – Get Your Guess In!
