Week of Prayer for Christians Unity: One Body, One Spirit!

As we begin to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity this Sunday, it is an opportune time to consider the wonderful Christian diversity and connection that we have in Lucan/ Palmerstown thanks to the foresight and good relationships of local clergy some decades ago. The last twelve months have seen a big turnover of clergy in Lucan & Palmerstown. We have said goodbyes to some of the clergy in most of the denominations this year and now bid a big welcome to the new appointees.



The clergy of all the established Christian denominations in Lucan and Palmerstown: Catholic, Church of Ireland, Presbyterian, Methodist & Indian Orthodox meet socially on a monthly basis to share items of shared interest and enjoy refreshments together. Core members of the parish team are part of this group also. Planning for prayer together for the Reading of the Nativity Account and for local ecumenical services occurs at the gatherings along with sharing of invitations to events of shared interest or celebration. All are welcome at the faith gatherings across all denominations with a local familiarity that is quite unusual in any area.

The theme for this year's week of prayer draws on Ephesians 4:4: ***There is one body and one Spirit.*** This theme is very apt in current times when we see disharmony, gross power struggles and dehumanisation of many in our international happenings. It is important that we gather in unity wherever we can as members of connected communities. As Christians we are held in the one body that is Christ where we find our meaning and purpose. We are held in community together to share with one another, to enjoy the gifts of our faith and community and to support one another. It's a space of collaborative friendship.

Each year a diocesan opening prayer service is celebrated in one particular location. This year the **Diocesan Service for the Opening of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity will be celebrated in the beautiful, new Indian Orthodox Church in Palmerstown on Sunday 18 January at 8.00p.m.** (opposite the Catholic Church of St Philomena and beside Aldi).

Our local Service of Prayer for Christian Unity will take place in the Presbyterian Church on Monday 26th January at 8.00p.m. All are welcome to attend both services to pray and celebrate together.

HEAR scheme

My child is from a disadvantaged background. Are there supports to help them access college?

Yes. Students from a disadvantaged background may qualify for the HEAR scheme, if they meet some other criteria.

With the HEAR scheme, students can get a place on their preferred college course, even if they don't have enough CAO points.

For example, if your child is eligible for HEAR and they get 350 points in their Leaving Certificate, they may be offered a place on a course that is 360 points.

This is called a 'reduced points' place.

However, they must still meet the minimum entry requirements and any specific course entry requirements (for example, a certain grade in maths or Irish).

What are the additional criteria?

To qualify for HEAR, your child must:

Be under 23 on 1 January 2026

Meet certain rules in relation to their financial and social circumstances.

How can my child apply for HEAR?

Students must apply online for HEAR through the CAO portal. **The deadline to apply is 5pm on 1 February 2026.** Then, the deadline to submit supporting documents is 10 March 2026.

DARE scheme

My teenager has a disability and will soon finish secondary school. Are there supports to help them access college?

Yes. With the DARE scheme, students with a disability or a specific learning difficulty can get a place on their preferred college course, even if they don't have enough CAO points.

For example, if they're eligible for DARE and get 350 points in the Leaving Certificate, they may be offered a place on a course that is 360 points.

This is called a 'reduced points' place.

However, they must still meet the minimum entry requirements and any specific course entry requirements (for example, a certain grade in maths or Irish).

What are the eligibility criteria?

To qualify for DARE, your child must:

Be under 23 on 1 January 2026

Provide evidence of their disability

Provide a statement about how their disability has affected their education

Disabilities considered under DARE include:

Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) and Attention

Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)

Autistic Spectrum Disorder (including Asperger's Syndrome)

Blind or vision impaired

Deaf or hearing impaired

Developmental Coordination Disorder (DCD) – Dyspraxia

Dyscalculia or significant numeracy difficulties

Dyslexia or significant literacy difficulties

Mental health condition

Neurological condition (including brain injury and epilepsy)

Physical disability

Significant ongoing illness

Speech and language communication disorder

How can my child apply for DARE?

Your child must apply online for DARE

through the CAO by 5pm, 1 February 2026.

If they're accepted as eligible for DARE, they'll then compete with other eligible students for 'reduced point places', based on their Leaving Certificate results.

Students can also apply to DARE with A-Levels from the UK, or other EU qualifications.

Drivers v Pedestrians!

In most cases, I welcome the Council's efforts to slow down traffic, and make roads safer for pedestrians, around Lucan.

However, I'm wondering when they had a policy change?

Some years ago, the same Council painted three roundabouts on the roads of Hillcrest Estate. This facilitated the flow of traffic greatly, but at the roundabout on Hillcrest Walk, near Tesco, pedestrians have been taking their lives in their hands trying to negotiate this junction!

It was formerly a T-junction, where traffic stopped before going on the main roadway. Now all traffic coming from the right has the right-of-way.

On top of that, many vehicles do not use indicators, leading to confusion, and several near misses with pedestrians. The speed at which this roundabout is taken at times, is very frightening.

Another issue is at the junction of Millstream Road and Old Corn Mill Road. It is simply too wide – even with an island in the middle. Many a walker has been taken by surprise, with a car speeding up from the Old Celbridge road, to this junction.

I do commend those decent drivers who give pedestrians a chance, particularly older people and those with buggies and small children, who might need a few seconds more to cross.

Again, I wonder how the Council Road Safety Department tally their two different approaches to road safety for all?

A special word of congratulations goes to 2nd yr Blake Carey, who achieved 2nd place in the Biological and Ecological Sciences Junior Individual category for his project "Do Micro-plastics in Freshwater Sediments Alter the Nitrogen Cycle?" Judges described the project as "interesting with interesting results" and were particularly impressed by Blake's identification of an inverse relationship between ammonia and nitrate.

Well done also to Modasir Ahadmanish, Mohammad Zamir and Nabil Wan Mohd Rozir, who received a Highly Commended Award in the Chemical, Physical and Mathematical Sciences Intermediate Group category for their project "Biomechanics of Hand Grip Strength vs Hand Size." This team delivered an engaging and well-structured investigation into whether hand size can predict grip strength in teenagers. We would like to extend our sincere thanks to local TDs Paul Gogarty and Shane Moynihan for

taking the time to engage so positively with our students. During the exhibition, both TDs stopped at the students' stalls, showing genuine interest in their work. They asked thoughtful questions about the projects on display and took time to listen carefully as students explained their ideas, research, and findings. Several students were also delighted to meet An Taoiseach, Micheál Martin, who took time to engage with the exhibition and speak with them about their projects and future ambitions.



The success of our students would not have been possible without the dedication and support of Ms. Farrell and Mr. Carey.

They supported the students throughout the entire process, offering expertise, motivation and practical assistance at every stage of their projects. The guidance and encouragement from both teachers ensured that students felt confident, prepared and proud of their work.

Many of the students are now keen to participate in upcoming SciFest competitions, inspired by their positive experiences at the RDS.

Bus Shelters:

At the January Council meeting my motion was passed requesting that publicly funded bus shelters be designated as exempted development removing the requirement for planning permission. All regulations and standards would still apply but the barrier of a full planning application would be removed. This follows ongoing delays locally where shelters removed during works have taken years to be reinstated often in the same locations. Bus shelters are a basic public service and this change could significantly speed up delivery.

Lucan Adamstown Station

The rail station at Adamstown Lucan is in ideal location for bus connections now and rail later. This station can have direct links to almost half of Dublin by bus, reducing travel times up to an hour, creating almost 30% extra capacity for locals non-stop by rail to city centre.



All country trains would stop at Adamstown; country trains would start 3 minutes earlier to make up for this delay. Most of the bus network already in place, two routes W4 and W6 need a short diversion to link with station. C25 replacing lost routes and replace L53 with a long route 53 to UCD via Ballyfermot, Kilemore Luas along R112 to Dundrum. Restore Airport Hopper bus from Maynooth via Adamstown rail station to achieve the necessary demand for viability. This avoids many users going into city to get a bus backout again.

Other Mainline rail routes out of Dublin have a country stop outside city centre at Maynooth on the Sligo rail line and Bray on the Wexford rail line. This would also be a great advantage for many users going to the countryside by rail, avoiding them having to go into the city to get their train, even better on way back. This is part of the NEW integrated transport plan for Dublin benefiting all Ireland. Adamstown is also vital for rail link up in the future.

The memorial was created by the internationally acclaimed sculptor Rowan Gillespie and presented to the city of Dublin in 1997. The sculpture features six life-size figures dressed in rags, clutching their children and belongings. In 2007, similar figures were unveiled at Ireland Park on the shores of Lake Ontario in Toronto, Canada. The work in Toronto commemorates the arrival of the tens of thousands of refugees in Toronto fleeing the Great Famine.



Because our own photos were a bit scarce, I have taken the liberty of including a photo I received from my friend in Arlington, Virginia recently of a red-tailed hawk that landed on the fence in her back garden. The red plumage can be seen on the underside of the bird's tail when it is in flight.
