Eaten Bread is Soon Forgotten!

Challenges are part of normal human life and normal group belonging. If there are no challenges currently, there is one waiting around the next corner! Challenges are part of the structure of momentum that keeps us in motion towards whatever future is destined for us. Chucking every unlabelled or unattractively decorated parcel out of the wagon is going to leave us without the prospect of unwrapping both welcome and unwelcome surprises. One of our current challenges is the situation of receiving refugees and asylum seekers.

As I waited at the traffic lights in Palmerstown last week, a dog fell out of a car which was going the opposite direction. ALL traffic stopped! Numerous car doors opened to run to pick up the poor frightened mite. The owners came running back from a parked car to lift up and carry the dog back to safety and comfort. This happened while I listened to a discussion on the radio about the prospect of refugees and asylum seekers being housed in various towns around the country. Has it reached a stage where we treat animals with more respect than people from situations about which we have no concrete knowledge and yet make judgment on a mass scale? That dog would have had a choice of beautiful homes if he were being abandoned!

In the past, the people of Ballaghaderreen and Ballyhaunis welcomed refugees from Syria and Libya when the prospect received a creative response from the resident communities. Both town communities work hard at integration and the celebration of multiculturalism so that harmony and healthy shared living is possible. New skills and new ideas are the consequence and add to the fabric of the communities.

Yes, we have a situation where the inclusion of a large number of people might be more than the resources can deal with so that the answer might need to be 'no' in the short term. If communities were to consider how it can be done rather than that it can't be done the demonstration of basic human respect would be shown to all regardless of country of origin, gender, colour of skin or religion. We cannot count on our elected leaders to do it all. It really is nothing less than shameful to hear the assumed description of male asylum seekers justifying the fact that they must sleep on the streets in sub-zero temperatures with no protection or basic subsistence.

All my siblings left Ireland in the 80s as economic emigrants and were received in various countries, with varied levels of welcome, where they have set up homes. The Irish left in their millions over the last two centuries out of necessity, some experiencing the most horrendous challenges. Among those millions are people from every single Irish family. Eaten bread is soon forgotten! We need the diversity which is brought by those arriving on our shores now and some among them will be the leaders of the future who will bring us towards a new way of being that we cannot imagine.

Death is such a difficult thing for any of us to face. Despite it being widespread, grief is often misunderstood. Grief is a natural response to the death of someone close. It does not follow a definite pattern and can be different for everyone. The bereaved can be left feeling isolated, lonely and confused. Family and friends may be unsure how best support them. Learning more about grief can help someone before and during the grieving process and can also help the people supporting them.

What Is National Grief Awareness Week?

This is the fourth year Irish Hospice Foundation is running a national grief awareness campaign. Originally hosted in November to coincide with the Good Grief Trust (UK) national campaign,

this campaign will now take place in January — a time which can be difficult for many people, including those who are grieving.

Through National Grief Awareness Week, we hope to encourage people to be more grief aware and encourage conversations about this typically uncomfortable subject.

Budget 2024

Statutory sick leave pay

On 1 January 2024, the entitlement to paid sick leave increased from 3 days to 5 days.

Changes to State Pension (Contributory)

Since 1 January 2024, you can:

Start claiming your State Pension (Contributory) at any age between 66 and 70.

Get Long-Term Carers Contributions to fill gaps in your contribution record for the State Pension (Contributory)

Changes to Pay-Related Social Insurance (PRSI)

From 1 January 2024, the upper age limit for PRSI exemption changed from 66 to age 70. This applies to the employee, the employer and people who are self-employed.

This does not apply to:

People who are already getting State Pension (Contributory).

People who are 66 years by 1 January 2024 (born before 1 January 1958)

Microgeneration scheme

From 1 January 2024 until 31 December 2025 if you sell your excess renewable energy back to the national grid, you are eligible for a tax exemption of up to €400 per year on the income generated from selling your excess electricity.

Student maintenance grants

From January 2024, there will be an increase in the 2023/2024 SUSI maintenance grant rate.

From January 2024, postgraduate students who meet the income thresholds can apply to SUSI for a maintenance grant. It will be paid from January to May for this academic year.





This is very useful information for Parents/Guardians as the 6th class students transition from primary to post-primary school. We look forward to meeting our future students on the day.

Exam News: Our 3rd and 6th yr students began their mock exams next week and which will go on until Friday 9th Feb, at which time they will have a well-earned mid-term break to recover from their exertions!

Rent-a-Room Relief: The €14,000 a year that can be earned from renting a room can now be disregarded in the means test for a medical card under proposed legislation approved by the Government. Medical card assessments will not be impacted by Rent-a-Room scheme participants who can earn up to €14,000 by privately renting out a room in their home. Previously this income was a contributing factor, along with other income and expenses, as to whether a person qualified for a medical card. Michael G was in Dun Laoghaire and came across the monument erected in honour of the visit of King George IV to what was then known as Dunleary in 1821. The king's visit led to the name of the town being changed to Kingstown. The town was given its present name in 1920. Near the George IV monument is a memorial to the sinking of the *RMS Leinster*. It comprises the anchor of the ship which was recovered by divers in 1991.

RMS Leinster served as the Kingstown-Holyhead mailboat until torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine on 10 October 1918, while bound for Holyhead. Researchers from the National Maritime Museum in Dun Laoghaire believe that at least 564 passengers, postal workers and crew lost their lives making it the largest single loss of life in the Irish Sea. The war ended one month later when Germany signed the Armistice at 11am on 11th November 1918.
