The danger is that we become inured to the sight of bombed out apartment blocks on our screens and they merge with the background that TV has become in our homes while we hardly notice.

Overview of Employment Rights Enforcement

If you are not getting your rights or entitlements, or if you lose your job and consider your dismissal was unfair, you can make a formal complaint – see 'How to make a complaint' below. Before making a formal complaint, you should try to resolve the dispute with your employer directly.

The main organisations that enforce employment rights are the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) and the Labour Court.

Workplace Relations Commission

The Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) promotes the improvement of workplace relations. It hears disputes and complaints about employment laws, and helps to resolve disputes by providing a range of services to employers, employees and trade unions.

WRC services include:

Inspection of employment rights compliance The provision of information Mediation Conciliation Advisory and adjudication services. The WRC deals with disputes about equality and discrimination. It has published the Guide to Employment, Labour and Equality Law (pdf).

The Labour Court

The Labour Court can investigate industrial disputes in certain circumstances. It also deals with all workplace relations appeals, so you can appeal to the Labour Court about a decision made by an adjudicator in the WRC.

Before the Workplace Relations Act 2015 came into effect on 1 October 2015 the Employment Appeals Tribunal dealt with workplace relations appeals. It continues to hear appeals submitted before the 1 October 2015.

Compensation payments and tax

If you are awarded a compensation payment as a result of an employment rights claim, in certain cases, the payment may be exempt from income tax under Section 7 of the Finance Act 2004. The exemption applies to payments arising out of recommendations or decisions by a relevant authority following a formal hearing or mediation.

You can read more details about this in Revenue's leaflet Exemption from Income Tax – IT 71(pdf).

How to make a complaint

If you have a complaint about your employment rights, you should first speak to your employer. If you cannot resolve your complaint informally, you can make a formal complaint to the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) using its online complaint form.

You should make your complaint to the WRC within 6 months of the alleged incident (dispute). This time limit can be extended by a further 6 months if there was a reasonable cause for the delay.

Your complaint should be about one of your employment rights under the relevant employment law. For example, your annual leave entitlement is set out under the Organisation of Working Time Act 1997.

Freemans Journal 16th May 1885 FUNERAL OF THE LATE COLONEL VESEY. D.I.

Yesterday the remains of the late Charles Colthurst Vesey, D.I., J.P. Colonel, Commanding the 5th Battalion Royal Dublin Fusiliers, were interred in the family mortuary chapel within the demesne of Lucan House, Lucan. The Kildare and Lucan tenantry of deceased attended and assisted by the labourers on the estate, bore the remains of their deceased landlord from his late residence. A guard of honour composed of seventeen sergeants of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers under the command of Captain Mansell, took part in bearing the remains to the grave. The remains were encased in a rich brown oak sarcophagus with brass fittings and breastplate, the latter bearing the following inscription:-

Colonel Charles Colthurst Vesey Born 18th June 1826 Died 11th May 1885

The burial service was conducted by the Rev C W Benson, Incumbent of Lucan. The following were the chief mourners EC Vesey (son), Colonel Colthurst, M.P.(brother), Sir George Colthurst Bart (nephew), Colonel GW Fraser and HC Warren.

The following noblemen and gentlemen attended-The Duke of Leinster, Lord Annally, HL Barton, General Brooke, Arthur Hamilton, Charles Hamilton, Alex Kirkpatrick of Coolmine, Wm Moran, John and James Wills, John A Walker. Colonel Vernon, Quartermaster Lowery etc, etc. The funeral arrangements were entrusted to Messrs Arthur Jones and Son, 135 Stephen's Green.



The funeral of Colonel Charles Colthurst Vesey was a well-organized event. Oddly there is no mention of his widow Anne who is laid to rest in the same spot, but she outlived him by 27 years.

Lucan Land Loophole 1977

Opposition in Lucan County Dublin to plans for a housing development on land currently used as a stud farm.



The village of Lucan is becoming the centre of fast growing suburban Dublin. It is growing too fast for the residents of Hillcrest Estate in Dodsboro, just outside Lucan. Their 750 house estate could be extended by a further 800 houses on land currently occupied by a stud farm.



The Hillcrest Residents' Association totally reject the development plan by Stein Investment. Tony Kelly chairman of the association is clear the Hillcrest residents are not anti-development. They want to see houses built where there is adequate infrastructure and facilities to accommodate an influx of people.

The residents do not believe Stein Investment is operating in a transparent fashion. Their development proposal has already been rejected by Dublin County Council on two occasions and is now under the planning appeals board.

The residents of Hillcrest Estate lack amenities. The shopping centre in the area is under construction. The Cottage Stores is the only shop serving the area. The national school is a temporary prefabricated building and also serves as the local church. The Hillcrest Residents' Association members cannot imagine the strain an increased population would put on the area.



Local Senator and Councillor Brian Lenihan and Teachtaí Dála (TD) Mark Clinton support the Hillcrest Residents' Association opposition to the Stein Investment development.

The Hillcrest Residents' Association wish to meet with Stein Investment but are having difficulties finding out who they are.

Nobody is willing to say that they have any connection with the company.

It transpires the principal director of Stein Investment is Captain Tim Rodgers owner of Airlie Stud Farm. He wishes to clear up any confusion about the company.

It is my company it belongs to me; I suppose you could say I'm Stein Investment.

He is happy to meet with members of the Hillcrest Residents' Association whenever they wish.

Captain Tim Rodgers' stud farm is zoned for agriculture. At the appeals board he will argue it is used for something else. If he is successful, planning permission will see the land price rise to $\pounds 20,000$ to $\pounds 30,000$ per acre.

Lecturer of Law in Trinity College Yvonne Scannell thinks it is important that people know who they are dealing with, especially at the planning appeals stage. She also believes it is in the developer's interest to have the cooperation of local people.

Planning is a democratic process and the more cooperation the better.

New Street Art Project Request – Adamstown: At the June local area committee, a motion I tabled on behalf of residents in Adamstown to explore the feasibility of a street art / mural project was agreed. The possible location for this will be the Adamstown Link Road Bridge that has become the site of continuous unwanted graffiti. Such a project as suggested to me by one Castlegate resident, could serve to promote the multicultural community here in a positive and colourful way. The arts office will liaise with the relevant department and if successful, will support the initiative in collaboration with the residents in Adamstown.

Necessary Tree Pruning – Rear of Arthur Griffith Park: SDCC in conjunction with ESB will be carrying out specific targeted tree pruning in Griffeen Valley Park and bordering with some homes, where growth has become problematic or dangerous to overhead wires.

accompanied Henry II to Ireland in 1174, was granted the "lands and harbour of Malahide." Between 1185 and the 1970s, the Talbot tenure at Malahide Castle was broken for only a brief interlude between 1649 and 1660 when their lands were seized by Cromwellian soldiers and the castle was occupied by Myles Corbet, Lord Chief Baron of Ireland. The castle was sold to the State in 1975.

By way of a footnote, it emerges that a relation of one of the members of the Camera Soiree has a close connection with the former owners of Tintern Abbey. It's a small world!
