A Snippet of Lucan History

Listening to the Gospel (*and sermon*) in St. Mary's Church recently, I was reminded of a newspaper article I read online about the unveiling of the stained-glass window, *The Transfiguration*, on the wall at the Sacristy. This window was donated to the parish by the Moran Family of St. Edmundsbury, nearly 140 years ago.

Its dedication reads:

In memory of Elizabeth Emilia, wife of William Moran, and of their deceased children. Pray for the repose of their souls.

The *Freeman's Journal* of 17 April **1884** carried a report that the window was unveiled at a Solemn High Mass in St. Mary's at 11.30 a.m. on the previous Sunday (April 13th). It described how, as the *Gloria in excelsis* was being intoned by the celebrant, the window was uncovered over what was then the High Altar. This took place over forty years after the church itself was consecrated (*on 5 January 1840*). One can only wonder what was there before the window was fitted.

The newspaper reported that 'the graceful design and rich colouring reflect much credit on the artistes of the *Windsor Glass Works*'. It credited a Dublin firm, *Millard* of Grantham-street, with the 'handsomely carved stone mullions' set to the design of an architect called Geoghegan. Apparently, in his sermon, the Rev. Alfred Murphy, S.J., 'eloquently blended the joys of the resurrection with the memory of the late Elizabeth Moran'.

William Moran and his wife were married in Calcutta about 1835. They had a large family but some of the children died either as infants or at quite a young age. Elizabeth Moran died on 6

ST. MARY'S CHURCH, LUCAN.

On Sunday the ceremony of unveiling a memorial window took place in St Mary's Church, Lucan. The window is at the east end over the high altar, and has been erected by William Moran, Esq. St Edmondsbury, in memory of his deceased wife and children. The subject is the Transfiguration, and the graceful design and rich colouring reflect much credit on the artistes of the Windsor Glass Works. The window has been set in handsomely carved stone mullions by the firm Millard, Grantham-street, according to the design of Mr. Geoghegan, architect. Solemn High Mass was sung at 114 o'clock, and as the celebrant in-toned the "Gloria in excelsis," the window was uncovered. A sermon was preached by the Rev Alfred Murphy, S J, who eloquently blended the joys of the resurrection with the memory of the deceased lady in whose honour the window is erected; and whose benevolence will be long remembered by the people of Lucan.

August 1880, at the reported age of 64 years. *The Irish Times* of 28 April 1888 carried a 'For Sale' notice for St. Edmundsbury, describing it as 'a handsome residence and demesne the property of William Moran, Esq, J.P.' William Moran died on 13 November 1894 and his death was registered in Kensington, London.

Credit History

Your Credit History is information about your loans. It includes details such as: The type of loans The amount of the loans The outstanding amount Any missed payments

This information is listed in a credit report. Credit reports are available for lenders (such as banks and credit unions) to check when they are considering applications for loans.

Credit reports are held by the Central Credit Register (CCR). The Central Credit Register does not give a credit score or credit rating. Your lender decides on your loan application based on their own lending policy.

You can request a copy of your own credit report online or apply by post.

If you are applying for an overdraft, mortgage, credit card or other type of loan, you can check your credit report before you apply. It can help you spot any missed payments you are not aware of or mistakes in your credit report.

How lenders use your credit record

When you apply for a loan or other type of credit, such as a credit card, overdraft, hire purchase or personal contract plan (PCP), the lender can use your credit history when deciding whether or not to lend to you.

The information on your credit report can be used to decide:

Whether to lend to you How much to allow you to borrow How much interest to charge you

Lenders may check your credit report when you:

Apply for a new loan Apply to have your existing loan restructured Have arrears on an existing loan Have gone over the limit of a credit card or overdraft

Under EU law, lenders must assess your creditworthiness before agreeing to give you a loan. Creditworthiness means your ability to repay the loan. This assessment must be based on the information you provide as part of your loan application, and also on the information in your credit report.

When you apply for a loan, the lender must check the Central Credit Register if the loan is for €2,000 or more.

Lenders can also check the Central Credit Register if the loan application is for under $\notin 2,000$ or: You have requested a re-structure of an existing loan There are arrears on an existing loan or a breach of a limit on a credit card or overdraft

Your consent is not required for lenders to check the Central Credit Register.

Separately, you may be required to give the lender permission to check your credit history on another database. Usually, this consent is part of your contract or agreement when you first apply for a loan, so you may not notice that you are giving consent.

What happens if you are refused a loan?

If you are refused a loan because of information in your credit report, the lender must tell you this. This applies to personal consumer credit agreements for amounts between \notin 200 and \notin 75,000. It does not apply to mortgages.

Dublin 10K Championship



The Custom House



was the English Architect James Gandon's first large scale commission. Work started on the construction of the Custom House in 1781. It was completed and opened for business ten years later. Gandon was also involved in the design of other significant building in Ireland including the Four Courts and Emo Court in County Laoise. The Custom House now has a visitor centre which is worth seeing.



The Ha'penny Bridge was constructed in 1816 and was originally called



the Wellington Bridge. Its official name is the Liffey Bridge. The bridge was built to replace ferries that had operated on the river. The toll initially was a halfpenny which was the same as that charged to use the ferry. The toll was abolished in 1919.
