The Suffering of a Nation



The world has looked on in disbelief at the horrors being unleashed on Ukraine before our very eyes. While Russia's invasion may not have gone according to Putin's master plan, the horrors continue and intensify. Each day brings new news of innocent civilians under bombardment and an ever-growing number of fatalities among women and children. This not the first time that Russia has employed such tactics, Chechnya and Syria spring to mind immediately.

What Putin has also underestimated is the sense or revulsion that his actions have given risen to throughout the world. He has unwittingly brought about an alliance of nations unparalleled since World War 2. Germany has completely altered its stance and has gone as far as providing defensive weapons to Ukraine along with many other nations; 141 countries of the United Nations have united in condemnation.

The unprecedented economic sanctions against Russia make concrete the reprehension in which the world holds its actions. Sadly, such sanctions will do precious little in the short term to bring an end to the attack, and ultimately it is the Russian people whose lives will suffer because of them. The Russian people are fed a diet of state-controlled propaganda and anybody who dares to contradict the official line faces lengthy imprisonment. Daily we see courageous people willing to suffer these draconian consequences in order that the truth be told, they are truly courageous individuals deserving of our admiration. To speak the truth to power in Putin's Russia is a dangerous thing.

Putin has threatened nuclear attack on any nation that comes to Ukraine's defence and despite the impassioned appeals of President Zelensky for the imposition of a no-fly zone that bully-boy threat seems to have rendered any intervention a non-runner. This of course creates a deadly precedent. What if the next aggressor is China moving in on Taiwan or indeed any nuclear armed country threatening a neighbour – will the sinister threat of the employment of nuclear weapons give them carte blanche? If this tactic works for Putin in this instance who is to say he will stop here? Do we stand back as observers and allow an aggressor an open season for the destruction of a free and sovereign nation? Clearly the wisdom of Solomon is called for here.

The Ukrainian people have shown a strength of character and a courageous spirit that leaves us all in admiration, we can only hope and pray that their resilient determination will see them through these terrible times and that they will emerge victorious. In the meantime we can all pray for an end to the madness.

Well done also to the class tutor student of the month winners who each received a 5euro vouchers for the school canteen in recognition of their application, co-operation and excellent behaviour throughout February.

Science/Business: Well done to 3rd yr Taha Farooqi who was part of a team that won "Best Overall Group" at the BT Young Scientist Business Bootcamp held in UCD last week. Taha was selected to take part in the four-day event from the pool of prize winners shortlisted for special awards, category winners and the top four award winners from this year's Exhibition, held virtually in January. Taha worked on a project, selected by the BT YSE judges, with four other Bootcamp students and they worked collaboratively to develop the idea further, based on the workshops they took part in throughout the week.

Taha's group were given the task of securing funding from "Headrite Sports" for a headband that investigates head related injuries in sports and seeks to design and develop wearable technology to better enable the measurement and recording of such head impacts. The group spent eight hours a day over the course of the four days on the UCD Campus working on this project. They also attended talks from guest speakers on topics ranging from CEOs to Patent Attorneys.

On the final day, the group presented their ideas to an expert panel of judges. The judges evaluated the presentation from the point of view of "Headrite Sports" and they were clearly impressed as they won the award for "Best Overall Group".

Soccer: Our 1st yr soccer team advanced to the last 16 of the Leinster Shield after a dramatic 4-3 extra time win against a spirited and talented Scoil Dara, Kilcock team last Wednesday. Two goals from Aidan Doyle, plus one each from Ben Lawless and Derry Ware, ensured the win for Lucan who will now face Celbridge CC in the 2nd rnd.

English: Our 6th yr HL students went to the Helix Theatre last week for a multi-media production of William Shakespeare's *Othello*. Two actors, playing Othello and Iago, performed monologues and key scenes live on stage and a cast of actors joined them on screen for the rest of the scenes.

The interpretation of the play began with scenes of The Black Lives Matter Movement. Our students actually felt that this backdrop was a little too political and that it would have been more effective if it was used as a social element instead. Technology and social media was used throughout the performance to further reinforce the timeless, universal nature of the play's themes of jealousy, appearance versus reality, revenge, racial prejudice, betrayal and love. Somewhat ironically, the students didn't particularly like these modern elements such as FaceTime, text messaging etc!

The vast majority of them really enjoyed the audience interaction and question time with the cast. They also enjoyed the highlighting of key themes at certain key moments and the use of the overhead projector to emphasise key quotes. The effective use of lighting to emphasise mood and atmosphere was well received as too was the dramatic, modern twist on the climax of the play. Overall, it was a hugely positive and rewarding experience for the students who were all really happy to get the opportunity to go on a school trip again.

Fundraising: A fundraiser in aid of Ukraine was held in the school last week. 3rd yr students Mateusz Graca and Konrad Ragnoli, members of the 87th Dublin Polish Scout Group, made contact with the Polish Scouting and Guiding Organisation to see if they could do anything to help the Ukrainian refugees arriving at the Polish border. There are currently a huge number of scouts helping out at the border one of the things they requested was financial assistance. Mateusz and Konrad approached Mr. Brady to see what could be done to raise some funds. As there was another fundraising event taking place at the same time, it was decided to simply organise a collection of 2euro from students and staff. In total 1.073euro was collected and Mateusz will now ensure that the funds go directly to the account of the Podkarpacka Scout Province ZHP in Poland. Coming to Ireland from Ukraine

Visas: Citizens of Ukraine do not need a visa to travel to Ireland. You also do not need proof that you have a COVID-19 vaccine, and you do not need to take a COVID-19 test before you arrive.

If you do not have a current passport, you can use another form of identification to travel to Ireland (for example, national ID card, expired passport or birth certificate). The Irish Government has asked airlines to accept these documents.

If you are travelling with family members who are not Ukrainian citizens, they may need a visa to come to Ireland.

You can read frequently asked questions from the Irish immigration authority, called Immigration Service Delivery (ISD), for visa and immigration information. The Irish Refugee Council also has information on coming to Ireland in Ukrainian.

Immigration and international protection:

When you arrive in Ireland, you should go to the reception centre set up at Dublin Airport. You will give your details and you will get a letter confirming that you have residence in Ireland under the Temporary Protection Directive from the immigration officer in Dublin Airport. Staff can also help you to get somewhere to stay if you need it, and help you to access financial support (money).

Temporary Protection Directive: The EU,

including Ireland, is using the Temporary Protection Directive. This means that you are allowed to work and access services and benefits without making an application for international protection (refugee status). This applies to:

Ukrainian citizens who lived in Ukraine before 24 February 2022

People who had refugee status (or another type of international protection) in Ukraine Stateless people who lived in Ukraine before 24 February 2022

Family members of the people above if they were living in Ukraine before 24 February 2022 It also applies to people who had a permanent Ukrainian residence permit who lived in Ukraine before 24 February 2022, and who cannot safely return to their countries.

You will get permission to live in Ireland for one year under the Temporary Protection Directive. Your permission may be extended after that. You will get a letter confirming that you have residence in Ireland under the Directive from the immigration officer in Dublin Airport.

Immigration Service Delivery (ISD – the Irish immigration authority) is working on arrangements to give letters to people who arrived in Ireland before 9 March 2022. We will update this page when more information is available.

Healthcare Provision – West Lucan: On the final day of the latest meeting in the formulation of the County Development Plan 2022-2028, I was delighted that a motion I tabled calling for more concentrated efforts to deliver upon the very basic of healthcare facilities needed within the rapidly emerging communities of Lucan West was passed. Healthcare facilities in Lucan are already over strained - newer large developments such as Shackleton, Hallwell, Paddocks and Adamstown, totalling some 3,000 families in a half a dozen developments are void of a local GP, dental practice, physiotherapist, or specialist treatment facility of any description. In fact, there isn't even a single pharmacy in the immediate vicinity. More needs to be done to see delivery of these services in tandem with housing and population growth.
