I've Lost My Mother! AGAIN!

I lose my mother on a regular basis! My mother is tiny, cute looking, endearing, beguiling, non-compliant, all-there and very charming. She has honed and enjoyed these qualities in latter years! She will proudly put her hand up to claim any of those adjectives. As I said, I lose her on a regular basis largely because of those qualities and more importantly because of the deficit of provision of and signage for blue badge parking!

I lose weight, feel a strong rush of adrenaline, start to sweat and shine glowingly when I open an envelope and realise that I am destined to bring my mother to an appointment in hospital outpatients. Her appointments work to great effect to keep her array of ailments under control. When the letter quivers in my hand I know that *Hide and Seek* will be involved.

The level of excitement that I feel, at the prospect of such an event, is greater if the appointment is in a hospital setting that is less familiar to me. The receptionists in Castlebar hospital probably think that my name is *I've Lost My Mother*. They usually shout to point me in the direction of my mother who might be in the neurology waiting area instead of the rumbling tummy area if a Dr Murphy or Dr Singh happen to work in both sites! I have speed date interviews with various people at entry in other hospitals before I'm pointed in a possible right direction.

Finding where the blue badge parking is, how many places are there and if I can acquire a place in a pre-drive aspect is like a treasure hunt with no guarantee of finding a clue. On most occasions, there are no spaces which necessitates stopping to dispatch my mother into the foyer with the command **DO. NOT. MOVE.** She will smile at me with eyebrows raised in clear indication that instructions will not be observed! During the time that I run at speed, with no respect for dignity, to drive my car to the car park she will smile very sweetly and connivingly to inveigle some innocent passer-by to deliver her to **ANY** consultants waiting area.

On other occasions, when it not either possible to find a blue badge space or to dispatch my mother I must wheel her from the car park, usually up a hill, down from footpaths and over speed ramps with gut bursting effort. My mother's osteoporosis is put through a challenge in the bone shaking journey which could not be survived without the safety belt being firmly fastened. On all occasions when I have pushed a wheelchair from the carpark, I have stood at the entrance of the hospital and looked back to see that directions to aid such a journey are clearly delivered to get one <u>from the hospital</u>, not to it! I feel like a bit piece actor in Mr Bean!

I would cry with sheer delight and have a Carlsberg moment if I could find my way, with clear directions, to the hospital as well as from it, knowing where to go, how to attain suitable parking without needing to abandon my mother and be able to focus on the purpose of the appointment, by which time I'm usually fit to crumble and melt on the floor. **This could all be made so much easier for everyone! HELP!**

Flexible Working

Since 7 March 2024, you have a new right to request a flexible working arrangement if you are a parent or carer.

You have the right to request remote working from your first day in a new job but you must have 6 months of continuous service with your employer before the arrangement can start.

Code of practice on flexible working

The law on the right to request flexible working is set out in Part 2 of the Work Life Balance and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2023.

The Workplace Relations Commission's (WRC) Code of Practice for Employers and Employees on the Right to Request Flexible Working and Right to Request Remote Working sets out practical guidance for employers and employees on how to make and handle requests for flexible working arrangements.

Our website has information on the duties and responsibilities set out in the code of practice. You and your employer can agree on more favourable arrangements than what is set out in the legislation.

Who has the right to request flexible working?

To request flexible working you must be either: A parent or acting 'in loco parentis' (acting as a parent to the child) of a child under 12, or under 16 if your child has a disability or long-term illness

A carer providing personal care or support to a specified person living in the same household, needing significant care for a serious medical reason

A specified person is your:

Child (including an adopted child); Spouse or civil partner; Cohabitant; Parent or grandparent Brother or sister; Housemate (any other person to those listed above who lives in the same house as you)

Length of service

You have the right to request remote working from your first day in a new job but you must have 6 months of continuous service (continuous employment) with your employer before the arrangement can start.

If you left your job and came back to the same employer within 26 weeks, this gap does not count towards the 6-month requirement.

What is flexible working?

Flexible working is an arrangement where your normal working hours or pattern is adjusted, including through remote working, flexible schedules, or reduced hours.

Depending on the role or business, flexible working can take various forms. You and your employer can agree a more favourable arrangement than what's set out in the legislation.

Types of flexible working Description

Part-time work - Fewer hours than full-time employees.

Term-time work - Unpaid leave for a specific period, often during summer.

Job-sharing - Full-time role split between two employees who share duties and benefits proportionally.

Flexitime - Varying start and finish times outside core hours, meeting required work hours per week or month

Compressed working hours - Full-time hours condensed into fewer days, for example a five-day week compressed into four days.

Remote Working - Working part or all of the week away from the employer's location, such as working from home.


Easter Raffle at SuperValu





The purchase of the Italian Embassy has proven to be a very prudent decision by SDCC to develop and enhance recreational facilities in the heart of the village. The Village Green, the Weir and Lucan Demesne are soon to receive their long overdue and much needed upgrades.

It is envisaged that the Embassy grounds will be made available by SDCC to everyone in Lucan and beyond to be used as a leisure facility providing outdoor spaces for cycling, walking, playing, picnicking as well as the house being opened after redevelopment as a Tourist Centre.

The Grounds of the Italian Ambassador Residence will provide a continuous park walk and cycle link from the Centre of Lucan Village to Leixlip, the Royal Canal, Park, Arthur Griffith Park, Griffeen Valley Parks and the Grand Canal. In the future the former Italian Ambassador grounds will be the focal point of the Liffey Valley greenway linking Celbridge to the Silver Bridge at Farmleigh and the Phoenix Park. SDCC and the community of Lucan need to develop a vision for this fantastic network of parks and amenities.

The development of the former Ambassador's Residence and ground needs to incorporate Lucan Demesne and St Catherines Park. Just look at the fantastic development at Avondale House and other similar historic sites and the positive impact they have had on their local community's wellbeing. The embassy grounds will be accessible by bike, car, bus, running and walking.

The population of Lucan has grown from 15000 (1991 census) to over 60,000 presently. In 3 years', time the development of Adamstown and Clonburris will push these numbers over 70000. Active travel promotes accessing leisure facilities and services by cycling, running, and walking. The reality is there are many situations where using active travel is not realistic. Elderly people, those with significant health issues, people with disabilities and young children would need to access the Embassy grounds via an alternative means such as car. It would be discriminatory not to provide people in the aforementioned groups, alternative access to this planned recreational development.

A Community car park is an essential and necessary component of the development of the embassy grounds. In the village, there is currently 1 car space for every 300 persons living in Lucan. In 1991 the ratio was 1 in 75. This means whilst the population of Lucan has increased over 4-fold

and growing whilst parking provision has remained at 1991 levels.

The Community car park will have to provide for a much greater number of car spaces then are provided by the 1991 car spaces that currently exist.

The Community carpark, which is long overdue, would have the potential to lead to Village enhancement by removing some on street parking to a less visible location within the Embassy grounds.

The proposed development of the Embassy grounds will provide a much-needed leisure facility in our wonderful village.

It is important that the Local Community contact their local SDCC Councillors and Politicians with their ideas, thoughts, and views in relation to developing these grounds to maximize the potential benefit of this unique opportunity to make a real positive difference to our community.


