We Didn't Know!

Whenever we hear discussion about the Holocaust of World War II, we cry out that we didn't know or the world would have done something! REALLY! Today we hear of thousands of babies who will be deprived of baby formula because transportation of goods is not permitted into Hamas. Babies die within hours of deprivation of food or water or basic hygiene needs. Their mothers cannot feed the babies themselves as their own bodies are depleted and in want of necessary hydration and nutrition also. What is our excuse today that we can tell future generations about why our adult generation did nothing to try to save the tiny, innocent and defenceless babies of Hamas?

Today, if we don't know it is because we choose not to know by our choice of media platforms. We have more information today than ever before so that all we need to do is look from the perspective of the most vulnerable as we listen to and watch the atrocities. Dr Mike Ryan of WHO warned two years ago that unhindered access to bring humanitarian aid to the warring territories was a basic need in time of war so that the injured might be healed and the hungry fed. In more recent times access has closed to such aid entering with it almost certainly guaranteeing that every baby will die as their needs are of such an urgent nature! The life of every baby born in the last 18 months will be taken unless urgent action is taken. This can only be perceived as genocide in the deliberate destruction of infants in the region.

Individuals might have little power beyond making financial contributions, speaking about the situation so that nobody has the excuse not to know and contributing time and talents as aid workers. One of our greatest power lies in speaking to politicians and in electing candidates who represent true human and enduring values rather than for what material goods they might provide us in the short term. A second power is that of choosing to inform ourselves fully and comprehensively. We are a global village and in over-looking the most vulnerable, no matter where they live, we dehumanise ourselves as well as those whom we choose to ignore.

As we look at the international stage on which our world leaders stand, capitalism and autocratic leadership seek only for power and profit, with no hesitation about taking from what is rightfully owned by a languishing nation in return for a shabby defence. How is this reflected in what we seek in our own lives on a micro scale! What are we teaching our children by our words and actions today? What will be said of us in fifty years? The very least that we can do is ensure that we have the right information and that we each do something, no matter how small.

Disabled Person's Parking Card or Permit

You can apply for a parking permit to allow you to park in disabled parking spaces in Ireland and the EU if you are a person with severe restricted mobility or are certified as blind.

The permit is available if you are a driver or passenger of a vehicle. It is valid for 2 years from the issue date.

The scheme is run in Ireland by the Disabled Drivers Association of Ireland (DDAI) and the Irish Wheelchair Association (IWA).


It costs €35 to apply and you can apply online to the IWA or the DDAI. They will ask you some questions to check if you qualify and then send you an application form by email or post.

The parking permit is known as the Disabled Person's Parking Card or Permit and the EU Parking Card for People with disabilities.

Check if you qualify

You can apply for a card if you are a person with severe restricted mobility or are certified as blind.

You will need one of the following:
Have your medical practitioner or
consultant certify that you meet the medical and
mobility criteria.



Be certified blind by Vision Ireland (formally National Council for the Blind), a GP, Ophthalmologist or Optician. You will still need to apply for the card.

You can check if you are eligible on the Disabled Drivers Association of Ireland website or the Irish Wheelchair Association website.

How to apply for a Primary Medical Certificate

You must apply for the Primary Medical Certificate through your Local Health Office. A Primary Medical Card is very useful as you can use it for other related benefits such as to exempt yourself from paying VAT, motor tax and Vehicle Registration Tax.

How to use the parking card

You can use the card in any vehicle you are travelling in, either as a passenger or driver. This means you can bring the card with you and display it in the vehicle that you are driving or travelling in.

You can park in assigned disabled person's parking spaces. These spaces have the wheelchair symbol painted on the ground or have a sign with a symbol displayed.

How to display your parking card

You must have a valid card displayed on your vehicle windshield to use a disabled parking space. The card will show your signature and photograph.

Travelling abroad

You can use the card when you travel within the EU. Make sure to bring your card with you.

It is an offence to park a vehicle in a disabled parking space unless you have a valid card. - more information on our website.



The Retreat

Another event that was very special to village life was the annual retreat. The retreat lasted for two weeks, the first week for the women of the parish, the second for the men. Mass was at 6am and the evening sermon at 8pm.

One never knew in advance the subject matter of the following night, with one exception, the night the sermon was to be on 'company keeping'. With that subject you were given prior notice.

As Lucan was a very rural area in those days, most of the courting was done in gateways, which at the time were very numerous around the village. Prior to the opening of the retreat it was not uncommon for Fr. Hooke and the Missioner to do a walk around the known courting posts late at evening. I recall this advice being handed down from the pulpit from a Jesuit Missioner during his sermon on company keeping, "Men, if you have to do your courting in gateways, the correct position to adapt for this purpose is for the man to stand on one side of the gate and the young lady to stand on the other side, and on no account should the man allow the raging lion out of his cage!"

The missions were usually given by the Jesuits or the Dominicans. They used different techniques to spell out their message. The Dominicans would pace up and down in front of the altar as they delivered their sermon, the Jesuits would deliver their sermons from the pulpit. The Jesuits were well known for their fire and brimstone sermons, and they had their audience trembling in their seats. Their last dramatic gesture would be to thump the cushion that covered the top of the pulpit. What the Missioner was not aware of was that Little Joe who cleaned the church was unable to reach up that high to clean the cushion and the result was that at the dramatic climax of his sermon, the Missioner was enveloped in a cloud of dust, which caused him to break into a fit of coughing and sneezing, and the sermon somewhat lost the impact the Missioner had been building up to.

The memories are from a time when people 'knew their place' in society, when the church and the long arm of the law were in charge!

Dáil report:

I spoke this week on the heartbreaking situation in Gaza, where 14,000 babies face imminent death as part of the humanitarian aid blockade. I also queried the ongoing and increasing delays in assessments of need for people with disabilities. Other contributions included speeches on biodiversity, supports for carers and the need for additional parking spaces in Adamstown.

I also met with residents and wrote to the Superintendent about a number of incidents of anti-social behaviour, largely being carried out by one group. St. Mary's Camera Soirée



The change in the weather this week did not stop members of the Camera Soiree getting out and about. These birds are common summer visitors throughout Ireland from mid-March to late-September. They spend the winter in southern Africa. According to a sailing superstition swallows were a good omen to those at sea. As swallows are land-based birds their appearance would have informed a sailor that he or she was close to shore.
