The unthinkable



Russian Television this past week ran a scary animated graphic which shows a nuclear missile launched by the Russians exploding in the sea off the north west coast of Ireland. Complete with commentary by one of Putin's henchmen, Dmitry Kiselyov it detailed how this 100 megatonne nuclear weapon would trigger a Tsunami of enormous proportions that would effectively destroy what they described as the 'British Isles'. The consequent radiation would leave a wasteland in its wake that would render the islands uninhabitable for generations. This horrific scenario was carried on the state-owned channel Russia-1 which is the most watched channel in Russia. It seems that Putin didn't appreciate Boris Johnston's utterances on their invasion of Ukraine and this response was intended to intimidate and frighten. For many of us it had the desired effect!

The threat of a nuclear war is a truly horrendous prospect and would unleash a tit-for-tat exchange of missiles that would potentially destroy our planet. In such a nightmare scenario there would be no winners.

Given the horrors we have seen unleashed on the innocents of Mariupol and other Ukrainian towns, it comes as no surprise that the threats extend beyond Ukraine's borders to all of Europe and beyond. The tactic of bullies is always to threaten and intimidate.

The position of the Russian Orthodox church on the conflict is a cause of great disappointment and the many calls for them to be expelled from the world council of churches are gaining momentum. There can be no justification by any church for the aggression of Russia towards the innocent.

Two of our Lucan parishes have welcomed Ukrainian families fleeing from the conflict, and they have found refuge from the horror that they have left behind. We should welcome these people with open arms and offer them a place of safety until the horror in their homeland has ended.

We pray that what we are seeing in Ukraine will come to an early end. May peace prevail.

Public Holidays and your Entitlements

Most employees are entitled to paid leave on public holidays. There is an exception for certain part-time employees – read about 'Part-time employees' below.

If you qualify for public holiday benefit, you are entitled to one of the following:

A paid day off on the public holiday An additional day of annual leave

An additional day's pay

A paid day off within a month of the public holiday

You can ask your employer at least 21 days before a public holiday, which of the alternatives will apply. If your employer does not respond at least 14 days before the public holiday, you are entitled to take the actual public holiday as a paid day off.

Your public holiday entitlements are set out in the Organisation of Working Time Act 1997. You can also read about the appropriate rate of daily pay in the Organisation of Working Time (Determination of Pay for Holidays) Regulations (SI 475/1997).

Online Safety

The internet and our computers, smartphones and other devices are crucial to our way of life. Although the internet has many benefits, it also has some risks. Online safety is essential for both children and adults.

This page explains some of the risks and dangers online, and how you can keep yourself and your child safe.

It also tells you where to get more support and information on online safety and cybercrime.

How to keep your child safe online

If your child spends time online, you should understand the risks that could put them in danger.

Online dangers include:

Loss of privacy: Sharing information in public that should be kept private (after information is posted online, it is outside your child's control) Inappropriate content: Adult material, hate speech, violence, dangerous dares or challenges

Cyberbullying: Bullying in the form of abusive and threatening texts or emails, messages on social media and chat rooms, or the posting of photos or video clips

Online grooming: Individuals targeting children through sexual coercion or extortion, usually on social media or gaming platforms

The most important thing is to communicate with your children about what they are doing online. Familiarise yourself with the apps and websites they are using.

Talk to your child about the important features and settings they can use, including:

How to adjust the security and privacy settings How to block or unfriend someone How to delete their own profile and account How to deal with inappropriate content (such as: turn off the screen, use the back button, tell a trusted adult, or report the content to the website or app where they found it)



Exam news: Our 6th yr Engineering students have completed their Leaving Cert project worth 25% of the overall marks. They had to design a model Formula 1 car and the final projects were all of a very high standard. The students sat their 1-day practical exam worth another 25% last week. This involved a 6-hour exam where they drew on the day from a number of prescribed pieces. They will sit their theory exam in June which is worth the final 50% of the marks.

Transition Year: TY students Conor Kelly and Andrew Duffy took part in a science camp last week, run by the Department of Food Science and Environmental Health on TU Dublin's state-of-the-art Grangegorman Campus in Dublin City Centre. The four-day camp provides students with a hands-on experience of the science of food. The students have attended sensory science workshops as well as laboratory sessions where they got to partake in practical activities such as measuring caffeine in different energy drinks. They also attended a demonstration of 3D printing of food and attended a workshop on science in society.

Open Evening: An Open Evening will take place in the school on Tuesday 10th May from 4-6pm for 6th class students that have already been offered a place in the school for September. These students have not had the chance to see the school yet due to Covid restrictions over the past few years so this is a great opportunity for them to visit us and see the facilities on offer, meet the teachers and staff and interact with some current students in the school. We look forward to meeting our soon-to-be new cohort of 1st yr students and their parents/guardians.

Soccer: Well done to our 1st yr soccer team who advanced to the Leinster Shield semi-finals after defeating Coláiste Pobail Setanta 5-2 in their 1-4 final encounter last Thursday. Lucan began the game on the front foot and they were rewarded for their enterprising play with the opening goal after just two minutes. Ben Lawless raced clear of the Setanta defence after a fine through ball from Vangjel Melengu, composed himself at the edge of the box and drilled a powerful right-footed shot low past the advancing keeper into the bottom right hand corner. Lucan went further in front soon after when Derry Ware got on the end of another brilliant ball from out wide by Sean Connell to deftly guide the ball across the keeper into the far corner with his right foot from close range.

The impressive Aidan Doyle added a third 10 mins later when he dropped his shoulder at the

edge of the box to create space for an effort on goal and fired in a precise shot that went in off the near post. Setanta pulled a goal back just before half-time after Lucan failed to clear a loose ball. The 2nd half followed much the same pattern as the 1st with Lucan in the ascendancy and after a sustained period of pressure at the start of the half, Ben Lawless got his second of the afternoon with another clinical right-footed finish from just inside the box to restore the team's 3 goal advantage.

Setanta reduced the deficit with a sweetly struck free-kick from 25yrds but the outcome was never really in doubt though and Ben Lawless completed the scoring with another impressive right-footed finish late on following a powerful, direct run past three defenders after a clever quick throw from Brian Whelan. Ben's 2nd hat-trick of the season brought his tally to 12 goals in just 7 games. Lucan now await news of their semi-final opponents with the match to be played within the next two weeks.





Any Truth in Weather Sayings?

Ne'er cast a clout, Before May is out.

Some people say it refers to the month of May. Others say it refers to the 'May' flower of the

Hawthorn Tree. Clout of course means clothing. There is some truth in both interpretations. Keep warm clothes nearby as in May a pleasant warm spell of weather



can be followed by a decidedly cool spell. An early 'May' flower means spring is ahead of schedule with the weather warming up. No harm to cast a clout in this case.

Rain before seven, Fine by eleven.

There is some truth in this as a weather front will sometimes Passover the country in less than four hours.



If Candlemas be fair and bright, Winter'll have another fight.

Candlemas Day is February 2. In this month sunny weather can sometimes be associated with a very cold air mass which can last for a few weeks. If course also you can have sunny weather

as a break in a mild unsettled spell. This saying cannot be relied on. There is an echo of this in the U.S. In

Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania on Groundhog Day (February 2) the citizens look out for the behaviour of their groundhog.



This animal is a squirrel type rodent. On leaving hibernation if he sees his own shadow he runs back inside his home as he considers that winter has not finished yet.

When clouds appear like rocks or towers, Earth's refreshed by frequent showers.

This one is quite reliable. When we have an unstable atmosphere (low pressure), warm air heated by the sun rises and forms clouds which sometimes can grow to great heights.



Then we have Cumulonimbus Clouds which can produce heavy rain and thunder. Nimbus is a Latin word meaning 'rain'. When we have clouds that are wider than they are tall this is a good sign for fair weather. With high pressure the air if fairly stable with no rain.

Fair weather clouds can be seen which sometimes have flat undersides.

High (heavy) pressure means air pressing down on the earth keeping things stable.

Low (light) pressure means air rising with the consequent rain clouds and possible wind blowing things about.

When the wind is in the East, 'Tis neither good for man or beast

This one has some truth in it. An easterly wind in winter can be very cold affecting the health of humans and animals. In summer an easterly wind



can be uncomfortably hot leading to a drought and affecting the quality of life.

If St. Swithin's thou be wet, For forty days it raineth yet.

St. Swithin's Day is July 15. This is a very well-known saying but weather statistics show it cannot be relied upon,

Halo around the sun or moon, Rain or snow is coming soon.

The halo effect is caused by light shining through the ice crystals of high cirrus clouds. These clouds mean a warm front is approaching with its band of rain.



So there's truth in the saying.

Weather References in Conversation. Under the Weather

This phrase means not feeling so well. During a storm at sea passengers with seasickness would go below deck and were 'under the weather' that other passengers were experiencing above!

Taking a Rain Check.

This phrase means declining an offer or suggestion to do something. It originates in American baseball. In the 1880's, if a match had to be postponed because of inclement weather ticketholders were given a ticket, known as a 'rain check', for another match.



Canal Cycle Loop Update: The Council is working to develop a cycle route to link the Grand and Royal Canal Greenways through Lucan. The first version of this plan included a cycle bridge alongside the historic Lucan Bridge and a cycle way through Sarsfield estate. In response to public consultation, these elements have now been omitted from the current scheme. The route will now end in Lucan Village and Lucan Bridge will remain as is. The plan has also been amended to include an alternative alignment through Brookvale open space.

Draft County Development Plan 2022-2028: A total of 84 submissions were received during the public consultation which closed on 26th April.
