

At long last it seems that the end of the pandemic twilight zone is truly in sight. We have all grown weary with the restrictions on our freedom and the shut-down of so many activities that give spice and flavour to our lives. Things we took for granted now seem like absolute luxury, and the prospect of meeting up with friends for a drink or a meal or welcoming family and friends to our homes beckons like all our birthdays have come together. As more people are vaccinated we can expect the gradual relaxation of restrictions and a welcome return to normality.

This week our churches can once again welcome real live congregations albeit in limited numbers, but it does mark real progress towards a return to normality. The restrictions will limit numbers as heretofore, based on social distancing within the church building. St. Mary's capacity is 69 people and people will be admitted on a first-come-first-served-basis.

Mass times have to change to allow one hour between Masses for ventilation and sanitisation of the church. Beginning on Saturday 16th May, Masses at St. Mary's will be as follows:

Sat Evening Vigil 5:00pm & 6:45 pm

Sunday: 8:45am, 10:30am, 12:15pm & 7:00pm Weekday Mass will be Mon-Sat at 10:00am & Funeral Masses will normally take place at 11:30am

All Masses will be available on the parish Webcam.

Stewards needed

In order to comply with the social distancing and sanitisation guidelines we will require volunteer stewards for each Mass. If you are willing to volunteer for one Mass on Sunday or weekdays contact Deirdre in the Parish office or fill in the online form on the parish website.

When the capacity (69 people) has been reached the church doors will be closed, please respect the regulations and don't shoot the messengers -i.e. our volunteer stewards.

Under present guidelines First Holy Communions and Confirmations cannot take place, and the Archbishop has indicated that these are unlikely to be permitted before Autumn. Baptisms are also still on hold.

Confessions return

The Sacrament of Reconciliation can however resume and Confessions will be heard in the Nun's Chapel on Saturday Morning's after the 10:00 am Mass and on Saturday Evenings after the 5:00pm Mass. Confession will also be available on Monday and Wednesday mornings after the 10:00am Mass. People coming to confession are asked to respect social distancing at all times.

We look forward to welcoming you back to St. Mary's, and hopefully, without the limitation of numbers before too long.





Art: Congratulations to 6th yr Kevin McGrane on receiving a place in The National College of Art & Design. NCAD is one of the most prestigious and renowned art colleges in Europe and can count icons such as Simone Rocha, Philip Treacy and W.B Yeats as alumni. Kevin has worked very hard developing his own unique style and skills across all areas of Art Craft & Design over the last 6 years. In the last two years he has challenged himself and started to focus on mixed media, a process that involves layering grounds and using a variety of drawing materials over these developed grounds. Kevin's attention to detail and use of chalk pastels is exceptional. Applying to NCAD this year was somewhat challenging as a physical portfolio was no longer accepted and all of Kevin's work had to be uploaded to an online portfolio. Kevin spent a great deal of time working independently in January as schools were closed and teachers and students were working remotely- this took a huge amount of dedication and commitment as Kevin was also keeping up with all the work with his other Leaving Certificate subjects.

Kevin's art teacher Ms. Ryan is extremely proud of Kevin, describing him as one of the most talented students she has ever had the privilege of teaching. She believes that Kevin's determination to push himself out of his comfort zone in the



subject has been key to his success and is delighted that NCAD are getting such a well-mannered, kind, pleasant and gifted young artist. Kevin is a wonderful ambassador for the school and we wish him all the best in his four years in NCAD.

CBA –Visual Art: Over the past 7 weeks the two second year Visual Art classes, Picasso & Van Gogh, have been working on their Classroom

Based Assessment (CBA) - 'Process to Realisation'. The students were given a task to design a public sculpture for any location in the world based on the themes issued by the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA). Both groups have worked very well and produced wonderful design sheets considering location influence and primary source drawing. Presentations of the work will take place over the coming days and each student will get the opportunity to digitally show their work to Ms Ryan and their fellow students. Ms. Ryan will assess their work and award a descriptor that will appear on their Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA) upon completion of their Junior Cycle.

Transition Year: Our two Transition Year groups, TY Edmund and TY Rice, went on a walking trip around Lucan with their Geography teachers Ms. Winters and Mr. Rafter last week. The trip was in preparation for a traffic survey that the students will be carrying out over the next week or so. The students covered 10km around the area in the brisk Spring air to observe how the land use in the area has changed over the years. They began at Woodies, looking at the bypass which split Lucan back in 1988. Their teachers explained how the land has changed from agricultural to retail in the space of a few decades.

They then moved on down towards the river Liffey to view the old Mills located along the Strawberry Beds. Along the route they came across the old cinema in Lucan village which has now become a bank and a residential area. The students then viewed the ruins of the Church of the Blessed Virgin, which they learned was built in the 1300's before suffering a slow descent into ruin in the 1600s. Today the grounds upon which the church was originally built are occupied by the Italian ambassador to Ireland so the students were careful not to trespass on Italian land and risk causing a potentially serious international incident!

In Lucan Village, the students looked around for the best sites to carry out their traffic survey, noting down all of the different routes into and out of the village. The trip then concluded with a visit to a 7th/12th century Ringfort, surmounted by a Souterrain known locally as "The Cave", situated past the Hollow on the grounds of Moat Hill House. The teachers also pointed out the various styles of housing along the way. The students are to be commended on their active participation, genuine interest, good manners and strict adherence to social distancing regulations

for the duration of their educational and enjoyable local excursion.

Public Holidays

There are 9 public holidays in Ireland each year. Public holidays may commemorate a special day or other event, for example, Saint Patrick's Day (17 March) or Christmas Day (25 December). On a public holiday, sometimes called a bank holiday, most businesses and schools close. Other services, for example, public transport still operate but often with restricted schedules. Public holidays are:

New Year's Day (1 January)
Saint Patrick's Day (17 March)
Easter Monday
First Monday in May
First Monday in June
First Monday in August
Last Monday in October
Christmas Day (25 December)
Saint Stephen's Day (26 December)

Good Friday is not a public holiday. While some schools and businesses close on that day, you

have no automatic entitlement to time off work on that day.

How is the date of Easter Monday determined each year? Easter Monday is the only public holiday that can vary significantly from year to year. The date of Easter moves every year. Easter should be the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after 21 March. This means that the earliest possible date for Easter Sunday in any year is 22 March, the latest is 25 April. Easter Monday falls on 5 April 2021 and on the following dates in 2022 and 2023: 18 April 2022 and 10 April 2023.

Lay off or short-time working: Many people have questions about public holidays during the COVID-19 pandemic. During lay off or short-time working, you still are employed by your employer and your contract of employment remains in force. This means that you are entitled to benefit for any public holidays that occur during the first 13 weeks of lay off. Part-time employee must have worked at least 40 hours in the 5 weeks before the public holiday. You do not accrue annual leave during lay off but you are entitled to take annual leave that you accrued before being laid off.

Rules: Your entitlement to public holidays is set out in the Organisation of Working Time Act 1997. Most employees are entitled to paid leave on public holidays. One exception is part-time employees who have not worked for their employer at least 40 hours in total in the 5 weeks before the public holiday.

If you qualify for public holiday benefit you are entitled to one of the following:
A paid day off on the public holiday
An additional day of annual leave
An additional day's pay
A paid day off within a month of the public holiday

You may ask your employer at least 21 days before a public holiday, which of the alternatives will apply. If your employer does not respond at least 14 days before the public holiday, you are entitled to take the actual public holiday as a paid day off.

The Organisation of Working Time:

(Determination of Pay For Holidays) Regulations (SI 475/1997) set out the appropriate rate of daily pay.

Part-time employees: If you have worked for your employer at least 40 hours in the 5 weeks before the public holiday and the public holiday falls on a day you normally work you are entitled to a day's pay for the public holiday. If you are

required to work that day you are entitled to an additional day's pay. Over

If you do not normally work on that particular day you should receive one-fifth of your weekly pay. Even if you are never rostered to work on a public holiday you are entitled to one-fifth of your weekly pay as compensation for the public holiday.

Sick leave on a public holiday: If you are a fulltime worker on sick leave during a public holiday, you are entitled to benefit for the public holiday you missed, as described above. (An employer can also choose to regard you as not on sick leave on the public holiday and pay you as normal for the public holiday. If this is the case, the public holiday is not counted as a sick leave day.)

If you are a part-time worker and you are on sick leave during a public holiday, you are entitled to benefit for the public holiday, provided you worked for your employer for at least 40 hours in the previous five-week period - see 'Part-time employees' above.

However, if you have been off work for more than 26 consecutive weeks due to illness or accident, or for more than 52 weeks due to an occupational accident and you are absent from work immediately before the public holiday because of this, you are not entitled to the public holiday.

Absence from work and public holiday entitlement: You are entitled to leave for any public holidays that occur while you are on maternity leave, parental leave, paternity leave or adoptive leave. These rights are set down in the Maternity Protection Acts 1994 and 2004, the Parental Leave Acts 1998 - 2019, the Paternity Leave and Benefit Act 2016 and the Adoptive Leave Acts 1995 and 2005 respectively.

You are not entitled to public holiday benefits if you were absent from work immediately before the public holiday and your absence is:

Over 13 weeks, due to lay off or some other reason and authorised by your employer. Due to a strike

After the first 13 weeks of carer's leave Losing your job

If your employment finishes during the week ending on the day before a public holiday and you have worked for your employer for the previous 4 weeks, you should receive an additional day's pay for the public holiday. This also applies to part-time employees who have established a right to the public holiday by working at least 40 hours in the previous 5 weeks. You can read more about this in 'Further information' below.

Public holidays falling on a weekend: If the public holiday falls on a day which is not a normal working day for that business (for example, on Saturday or Sunday) you are still entitled to benefit for that public holiday, but you do not have any automatic legal entitlement to have the next working day off work. Read more on workplacerelations.ie.

How to apply: You can find out more about public holidays in this explanatory booklet on holidays and public holidays (pdf) or from the Workplace Relations Commission's Information and Customer Service - see 'Where to apply' below.

If you are not getting your public holiday entitlement you may make a complaint under the Organisation of Working Time Act within 6 months of the dispute or complaint occuring. You must use the online complaint form from workplacerelations.ie. The time limit may be extended for up to a further 6 months, but only where there is a reasonable cause which prevented you from bringing the complaint within the normal time limit.

Termination of employment and public

holidays: In the case of Gazboro Ltd. -v- BATU (DWT9916) the claimants ceased to be employed on 18 December 1998. They claimed an entitlement to be paid in respect of 25 and 26 December. As the Court interpreted the wording of Section 23(2)(a) of the Organisation of Working Time Act 1997, the week ending at midnight on 24 December began at midnight on 18 December. Since the claimants worked for the employer during the 4 weeks preceding that week they were entitled to an additional day's pay in respect of 25 December. The week ending on 25 December began at midnight on 19 December. Since the claimants ceased to be employed on 18 December they had no entitlement under the Act in respect of 26 December.
