Survey that will shape the Future Shape of Education in Ireland!

A survey has been launched by the Department of Education regarding three aspects:

- Would you prefer your primary school to be a co-educational school or a single-sex school?
- Would you prefer your primary school to be under a religious patron or to operate under a multi-denominational?
- Would you prefer your primary school to provide education primarily through the English language or through the Irish language?

This survey is for parents and guardians of children in primary school or who will enter primary school in the coming years. There is a separate survey for primary school staff and board of management members.

Parents and guardians will need Eircode to do the survey. The Eircode operates as a PIN for this purpose.

This survey is really, very important and is most significant as a marker that will determine the shape of Primary Schools that exist in the future. It is very important that every single eligible person makes their voice heard as it will make a difference to the next generation of primary school children and each family.

Before completing the survey, give serious consideration to what each question and response really means. If considering the ethos of a school, consider all the implications for you and for your children's children. Consider what would change for you is the ethos were different. It will have impact that will drive towards whatever shape parents, teachers and members of Board of Management determine in this survey.

- What practical and aspirational differences would each choice make in the life of your family now or in the future?
- What are the implications of each choice in each of the three questions? Talk with people in your circle and outside your circle to form an objective opinion.
- What family values are reflected in the choices offered to you in the choices in survey?

Your participation really matters!
Your choices really matter! Your answers really matter!
Every single voice matters!

Use your voice for the sake of your children and the children of the nation now and in the future!

Bullying in the Workplace

What is workplace bullying?

Bullying is repeated inappropriate behaviour that undermines your right to dignity at work. One isolated incident is not considered bullying. It usually takes place over a period of time. Bullying can be done by one or more people towards an individual or a group.

By law, employers must prevent bullying at work. They must also display a summary of their antibullying policy prominently in the workplace.

What can I do if I am bullied at work? If you feel you are being bullied at work, you should:

Gather evidence: If you think you are being bullied keep copies of any relevant supporting information, such as notes or emails. Check your employer's anti-bullying policy and follow its guidelines.

Get advice: Speak to someone about how you might deal with the problem. This could be a friend or colleague, a designated person at work, a trade union representative or your manager or supervisor. You can also get advice on your options from the National Anti-Bullying Research and Resource Centre or the HSA Contact Centre.

Try to resolve the issue informally: Very often, an informal approach will resolve the issue.

What are my options if an informal approach doesn't work?

If an informal approach does not work, you should follow your employer's formal bullying and harassment complaint process.

This policy on bullying should clearly set out: What happens when a formal complaint is made How the complaint will be investigated.

Who will handle the investigation (confidentiality must be maintained).

The appeals process.

You can find out more about the formal and appeals processes in the Code of Practice for Employers and Employees on the Prevention and Resolution of Bullying at Work.

If you feel that your complaint about bullying has not been dealt with properly by your employer, you may make a complaint to the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC). You must use their online complaint form. You must make your complaint within 6 months. This time limit can be increased to 12 months if you can show there was a "reasonable cause" for the delay.

If you apply online by 20 January 2026, you can pay the discounted fee of \in 35. The fee will then increase to \in 50.

Remember, when completing your CAO application, you may also apply for the:

DARE admissions scheme if you have a disability

HEAR admissions scheme if you're from a disadvantaged background

For DARE and HEAR applications, you must apply to the CAO by 1 February 2026.

Late applications are not accepted.



Thank you to Fr. Bill and Deacon John for a memorable morning. Both were warmly welcomed by all our members and committee.



Niamh Fitzpatrick will be our guest speak for the evening, bringing together her personal experience of grief and her professional expertise as a psychotherapist. Niamh has degrees in Psychology, Clinical Psychology, and Sport Psychology and is a regular speaker with Zeminar, Shona.ie, Let's Talk Mental Health at Work, Network Ireland, the Psychological Society of Ireland, and The Irish Hospice Foundation.

She will share her learnings and insights as she navigates her own experience of grief, having suffered a traumatic loss in March 2017, when her sister, Capt. Dara Fitzpatrick, was one of the four crew killed when Irish Coast Guard rescue helicopter Rescue 116 crashed while out on a mission. This session may be especially beneficial for parents seeking to understand their children's unique perspectives on grief, and those navigating traumatic or sudden losses.

Wellbeing: Last week, our school community came together to celebrate Wellbeing and Friendship Week, a special event dedicated to promoting resilience, inclusion, and the importance of positive relationships. The week was a wonderful success, with students from all year groups engaging enthusiastically in a range of workshops, performances, and activities designed to support their personal growth and wellbeing.

The week began on Monday, when our 6th yr students took part in an insightful Study Skills and Resilience Workshop facilitated by The Super Generation. This session focused on developing practical strategies for effective studying, time management, and stress reduction, particularly valuable as students prepared for their November exams.

On Tuesday, attention turned to our 2nd yrs, who attended a powerful one-man performance by Mike O'Sullivan. His play, centred on the theme of drug awareness, combined drama and storytelling to highlight the real-life consequences of substance misuse and the importance of making positive, informed choices. The performance was both moving and thought-provoking, sparking meaningful discussion among students.

Later that day, 3rd yr students also attended a performance by Mike O'Sullivan — this time focusing on the theme of anti-racism. Through his engaging performance, Mike explored the importance of empathy, respect, and standing up against prejudice in all its forms. Students responded with maturity and reflection, demonstrating great understanding of the message at the heart of the play.

On Wednesday, our 1st yrs were warmly welcomed with a special Welcome Breakfast held in the school canteen.

Thursday saw our Transition Year students take part in a Resilience and Wellbeing Workshop led by Stephen Kiernan. Through interactive activities and discussions, Stephen encouraged students to reflect on their personal strengths, set goals, and build habits that support mental and emotional wellbeing. TY students engaged fully, showing great interest in learning tools to help them navigate challenges with confidence and optimism.

The week concluded on Friday with another excellent workshop from The Super Generation, this time for 5th Year students. The session focused on resilience, wellbeing, and stress management, offering practical techniques to handle pressure both inside and outside the classroom. Students appreciated the opportunity to pause, reflect, and consider how to maintain balance during their senior cycle studies. Throughout the week, students demonstrated exemplary behaviour and a commendable level of engagement and participation. Their positive attitude and enthusiasm made the event a true success.

Soccer: Our 1st yr soccer team were beaten 6-2 by Lucan CC in their Dublin Metropolitan League encounter. Evan Gill and Karl Horan scored the goals but, despite hitting the crossbar on two occasions, the team were 2nd best to a very good LCC team, who thoroughly deserved their victory.

Lucan dominated the 1st half, restricting their opponents to just 4 points, while being clinical with their own opportunities. Chicago day 1: The hotel is gearing up for hosting the competition from tomorrow so great excitement all around. Today, we are going to the Field Museum and the Skydeck Observation Tower so it will be nice to be out in daylight and to see Chicago. This morning, all students are wearing their courtroom attire and are all set for the off.



A big thank you to the local resident who flagged an issue with pedestrian lights at the entrance to The Paddocks on Dodsboro Road. I contacted SDCC, highlighting the urgency, as children regularly cross here. Their traffic light contractor attended that evening and identified a memory fault caused by a recent power failure. TD Gogarty and I have logged repeated requests for repairs to SDCC but the outages keep happening; this is unacceptable for public safety. More to follow.

Go-Ahead Bus:

Last week, I met with Go Ahead Ireland to discuss local bus services they operate. They went through improvements in performance on the W4 route but it is imperative that this service continues to improve. I have also **requested inclusion of** Blanchardstown Hospital on the W4 and L52 routes. I have also requested increased frequency at peak times on the L51 route, which will now be reviewed by Go Ahead Ireland in conjunction with the NTA.

Pennyhill/R136 lights:

There have been a number of recurring faults at this junction over the last two weeks. I have raised this with the Council, and they inform me that the underground cable has been repaired, and part of the junction is currently being rewired to address the issue fully. The maintenance contractor has been instructed to work to keep any downtime to a minimum during the repair period.

This week I spoke on auto enrolment, budgetary measures, transport costs, and contributed to debates on science funding and potentially reducing the voting age. In the Enterprise Committee we deliberated on the legislation regarding the collection of royalties for musicians and performers.

I also attended a briefing on the family courts about the need to abolish the "in camera" rule. Independent Living:

As part of my continued efforts to secure independent living/age-friendly accommodation I recently raised this through a formal Council question. In response, officials confirmed active and planned developments in Sarsfield Park, Somerton Gate and Clonburris Phases 3/4. I'll continue pushing to ensure these vital homes are delivered for our community.

Bus Shelters:

I've again raised concerns about the removal of bus shelters from several key Lucan locations including high-usage stops. My motion tabled for the upcoming Area Committee meeting calls on the Chief Executive to engage directly with the NTA for an urgent update on reinstatement timelines.

Over the past few months, I've been working diligently on the Council's **Budget'25** process to ensure Lucan receives essential investment and benefits from key countywide initiatives. Once the budget is passed I'll share a full update next week.

Metro Link

Metro Link from the Airport won't be fully effective until all the following are implemented as outlined in the recent planning board decision to grant Metro Link planning permission.

Twelve Luas lines, two more extra underground metro's, a new Dart line from Malahide beside existing Dart line with link to Airport and an underground rail line from Connolly Station via Stephen's Green to Heuston, this with Dart plus.

Even if all of these were done at massive extra cost over decades in time, it still won't be effective as they all go direct to the city centre, adding up to two hours extra per day for many users working outside the city centre. It would only serve just over a fifteen- mile radius of the city centre. No orbital link on outskirts. All the other areas in the greater Dublin Area are omitted, where the real traffic problems begin.

This is a massive mess with big risks. Someone should call halt. This report is available online for anyone to see. The alternative is Metro Dart, using existing or heavy rail through Airport benefiting all Dublin and All Ireland at a fraction of Metro Link cost. On acratu.com.
