There are numerous teams of people in our parishes who volunteer in ministries to serve the spiritual needs of parishioners at various stages of life. One of the teams, is the **Funeral Ministry Team** which serves all who arrive at our parishes to celebrate the funeral of their deceased loved ones. We recently celebrated the Remembrance Mass for all who died in the last year. We are blessed to have so many who are willing to give of their time and

talents to make a difference in this celebration: those who provide music, prepare the church, manage the IT, organise the beautiful candles, inscribing the names of the deceased loved ones on each candle, formation of the leaflet, etc. Below is a summarised account of the service provided by the Funeral Ministry Teams in our parishes.

Ministry of Funeral Team

The Funeral Team accompanies the bereaved on their loved one's final journey.

Initially, the priest and a member of the **Funeral Team** meet with the bereaved family. We provide the family with a copy a booklet: *A Celebration of Life* which has information about the **Funeral Liturgy** and has examples of readings and prayers which might be used. We talk about the deceased person and the **Funeral Mass**. We also discuss if the bereaved would like prayers said the night before the funeral and/or on the morning of the funeral. We will be in the church on the morning of the funeral as a support.

If the priest or deacon is not available, we can attend the crematorium or the graveside for the **Final Committal** if needed. It is our privilege to be a support as a difficult time.

We organise the **Annual Remembrance Mass** in November for all from the Parish who have died in the year. We specially invite the bereaved to this Mass.

What is a gift voucher?

A gift voucher is a card or voucher you can use instead of money to pay for goods and services.

There are many benefits to gift vouchers but there are also some risks. For example, if you lose the voucher, it expires before you use it, or you are not able to spend the remaining balance. It is important you know the conditions and rules that apply to the gift voucher before you buy.

The Consumer Protection (Gift Vouchers) Act 2019 introduced extra rights for gift vouchers sold after 2 December 2019.

Types of gift vouchers

Gift vouchers can be paper certificates, electronic cards or gift cards. They can come from a single business or a group, such as a shopping centre.

Electronic money gift card

Electronic money gift cards (for example, One4all gift cards) can be used in different shops.

Before you buy the card, you must be told about the conditions for using it, including any fees. Fees must be proportionate and should match the actual costs to the business for issuing the card.

Electronic money gift cards are regulated under the European Communities (Electronic Money) Regulations 2011. The Central Bank enforces rules for electronic money gift cards.

Rules covering gift vouchers

Gift vouchers sold after 2 December 2019 must have no expiry date or be valid for at least 5 years.

The seller cannot:

Force you to use the entire gift voucher in one go.

Charge a fee for changing the name on a gift voucher (if name registration is required).

If there is more than €1 left on your gift voucher after a purchase, the seller must refund you the balance. They can do this with cash, transfer it electronically to your bank or by giving you another gift voucher.

Exceptions to the rules

The rules do not cover vouchers that: Can only be used to buy goods and services at a discounted price, from a specific seller on a set date, or for 3 months or less (such as deal websites like Groupon or Pigsback).

Are part of a customer loyalty or promotion scheme

You got as a refund for returned goods Were sold before 2 December 2019 - the original expiry date and terms still apply to these vouchers

Irish Council for Prisoners Overseas

The Irish Council for Prisoners Overseas (ICPO) is a charitable organisation that works to provide information and support to Irish people imprisoned overseas and their families.

ICPO services include

Providing information and support to prisoners and their families on a wide range of issues, including repatriation, deportation, health, legal matters, discrimination and ill-treatment

Represent prisoners' interests to relevant parties such as Irish embassies and consulates, welfare agencies, probation and legal officers

The ICPO holds a Family Information Day each year to provide families with information and support and to give them the opportunity to meet other people who have a relative in prison overseas.



Letter to the Editor,

Many of us in Hillcrest Estate (and perhaps other estates in Lucan) may have received a leaflet through their letter boxes this past week purporting to come from a company called Clothes Aid.

According to the leaflet, they were collecting second-hand clothes, bed linen, etc. on behalf of the ISPCC's (Irish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children) Childline charity. Except that this was a hoax! I phoned the Clothes Aid company and asked about the leaflet. The person said that they were a reputable company, based in England, but they had not operated in Ireland for many years. They took the details of the leaflet and said the company would follow it up.

I then phoned the ISPCC and told them about the leaflet. The person there thanked me for contacting them and they also took down all the details and would follow it up. They said that this had happened several times over the last few years and consequently, they had to stop this form of fund-raising completely.

To add insult to injury, the leaflet states "Only authorised Clothes Aid collectors are permitted by Clothes Aid of the ISPCC for collect this bag. If you are not authorised by Clothes Aid or the ISPCC to remove this bag or its contents, you are committing a criminal offence and may be prosecuted."

Lucan Village GREEN!

I read Tony Feeney's article in the newsletter two weeks ago and as the situation has become even more frustrating, I take pen to the same issue again! Tony stated the thoughts and feelings of everyone who lives in and passes through Lucan.

In times when we are encouraged to increase the number of trees and wild grasses in our environment for the sake of encouraging a more diverse wild life and to ensure water run-off, it makes no sense that our 'GREEN' is currently a concrete monstrosity. While the declared intention is to make it more attractive and give it new life, this tiny space is taking longer to construct than whole estates of houses! How on earth could it take so long to carry out these small scale-works! The final product, on visuals provided, presents some small amount of manicured grass surrounded by stone walls and a concrete amphitheatre. A few trees will be planted, but if they are not already very hardy and mature, they won't survive!

The heart has been ripped out of the village as the whole exercise of passing through or doing business there, is to be avoided. Yes, we do need to reduce the use of cars, but unless funiculars are to be envisioned and provided, the hills out of the bowl of the village will cause everyone with either a time deficit or difficult walking with sure incarceration in their houses! This is particularly evident as we struggle through the uncoordinated series of roadworks with unpredictably placed Stop/Go in more than one place in Lucan every day, for a very long time now. It was with disbelief that such was placed outside St Mary's Church on Sunday 16th November causing challenges for all attending Sunday Mass. The same presented at St Patrick's Church some weeks ago on a Sunday also! I shudder at the very thought of passing through Lucan on any day as it is certain to eat up valuable time navigating any small distance.

The GREEN became a flood plain at the weekend during the very heavy rains. I know this is not a new phenomenon. We know that water needs to be able to seep downwards as well as back into the river through green space; this is not facilitated by increased hard surface area! It really is debatable if this renewal of the Village Green was ever needed while the many declarations of near completion are more than well overdue.

I would be delighted to be proven wrong in all that I am now writing and if that becomes possible, let someone shout it from the rooftops in the future! I'll gladly celebrate and come to cheer them on!

"Our Lost Village Green"

For many generations, residents regarded the Village Green as the "Heart of Lucan".. Centrally located, the area was appreciated for its peacefulness and value, bringing together people of all ages—serving as a place for gatherings, children's play, and community connection through it. The park was a key open space filled with greenery and soft landscaping. It was an essential part of our identity.

South Dublin County Council has been responsible for the major changes to the Village Green, namely, removing many mature trees and much of the greenery. These trees did more than just add beauty—they helped reduce pollution from busy roads, blocked out some of the traffic noise, and provided shade and shelter from both sun and rain. They also created a peaceful and private atmosphere that shaped the village centre. That sense of balance has now been lost.

What stands in their place is a harsh, concrete expanse-a so called "enhanced Village Green "that feels more like an open amphitheatre than a welcoming community space. It lacks greenery, comfort, safety, softness and warmth. It is now anything but green.

Furthermore, this concrete structure clashes with the historical architectural style of Lucan Village and sadly diminishes the distinct and quaint character of the village which made it so unique and special. Let's be honest the present condition of the park no longer aligns with the traditional definition of a Village Green. This development underscores the potential impacts of projects conducted without comprehensive resident consultation and thoughtful consideration of local architectural heritage and historical context

The plaza style development is more suitably aligned with the character of a large town centre projects, such as those found at Dundrum and Liffey Valley Shopping Centre.

This project has generated considerable concern within our community. The protracted nature of these works has notably restricted access to the village businesses and services, adversely impacting its overall vibrancy. As a community, it is essential to advocate for future plans that emphasise environmental sustainability, meaningful stakeholder engagement, and authentic respect for local identity. Our collective input is important and should be actively considered By South Dublin County Council in decision-making processes. Contact your local Councillors and TDs to express how important Lucan's heritage, green areas, and community spaces are to you. Once these assets are lost, they cannot be recovered. Lucan deserves better.







Busy week in the Dáil and Committees. Items I raised or spoke on included Scoliosis treatment, pollution of waterways, Ukraine, European Council and General Affairs Council, tourism legislation and the Occupied Territories Bill.

Lucan Swimming Pool:

I used a topical debate slot in Dáil to seek an inquiry into time delays and cost increases associated with Lucan Leisure Centre/Pool project up to the recent termination of the contract. The response was non-committal, so we will have to wait until completion for a report. On a positive note, the new contractor has been appointed.

St Patricks Hospital (St Eds) Expansion Plans:

A hospital is permitted in principle under current land zoning, but I will be making a submission about size/scale/traffic/transport issues when planning application is submitted. More anon.

Flooding Lucan:

I received and reported incidents of flooding at several locations, including Hillcrest, Finnstown, Dodsboro Road, Tubber Lane, Arthur Griffith Park, Griffeen Valley Park, and at Courtney's. Areas experiencing persistent flooding are escalated for further investigation to the council or Uisce Éireann where appropriate. On a positive note, areas where recent remediation works were completed — e.g. Liffey Bridge, Lucan Village, and Newcastle Road — did not flood.

N4 Footbridge:

The gully and adjacent drainage pipe are blocked by sediment and tree roots. A contractor is appointed to clear the blockage and remove roots near the ramp to the N4 footbridge.

Welcome New Gardaí to Lucan:

Five new Gardaí joined Lucan and Ronanstown stations following a strong recruitment year with over 11,100 applications. This week, 223 recruits entered Templemore — the largest intake in over a decade.

SDCC Budget 2026: Positive Changes Ahead SDCC's 2026 budget brings real improvements for our community. Two extra Park Rangers will be hired to enhance safety and maintenance, alongside two new Dog Wardens. Planning Enforcement officers will double from two to four, strengthening compliance. SDCC is progressing CCTV installation in parks (with Data Protection oversight) to curb anti-social behaviour, a long-standing public request. €200,000 is allocated for accessibility audits and a parking app is planned.

Proposed Plans for St. Edmundsbuey:

I attended a briefing on proposed plans for 200bed mental health hospital within the walled garden. The design respects heritage and includes

a public café. No

encroachment on Liffey Valley SAAO. I broadly welcome the plans but will review traffic management fully once application is live. View the proposal via QR code.

South Dublin County Council Annual Budget

The Annual Budget 2026 marks a positive step forward for disability inclusion and for Lucan with several commitments that I advocated for now firmly secured. For the first time, funding has been allocated to establish a Disability Consultative Panel and to carry out accessibility audits in our villages. This reflects ongoing work to ensure that disabled people help shape decisions, not just experience the outcomes. I also worked to strengthen the focus on Lucan within this budget. Investment in Lucan House, the 12th Lock enterprise project, the Grand Canal Greenway and village and district enhancements now includes clear commitments to universal design, ensuring these projects are accessible for disabled children, adults and older people. Additional wins include increased support for the Sports Inclusion Disability Programme, Special Olympics, accessible footpaths and dishings, communication boards in playgrounds, sensory trails, and a new pilot providing real-time information on accessible parking spaces.


