Long Covid



The two years of the Covid pandemic posed all kinds of difficulties for individuals, businesses and institutions, and while the danger days seem to have passed, the ongoing effects are all too in evidence. Many people are suffering the physical effects of what is characterised as long-covid, and by the sounds of it, these are anything but pleasant. People report a range of distressing symptoms from respiratory problems to ongoing fatigue to mental confusion

they describe as brain fog, and even cardiac complications; not a pleasant legacy.

Many small businesses have gone to the wall and simply never re-opened, and many others are teetering on the brink, trying to cope with reduced customer numbers. Into this already deadly mix we now need to factor in, the ever-spiralling rate of inflation, with rapidly increasing energy costs and the stranglehold they impose. Change can be seen in the many restaurants that flourished in the past that now open just a few days in the week and there are many empty tables. Staffing is proving a problem for many businesses as many migrant workers returned home during the pandemic and have not returned.

While not wishing to be political in any partisan sense, it does seem to me as a non-partisan observer, that the budget introduced on Tuesday last, represents an honest attempt to address the issues, and to offer a safety net to those most affected. Like all political responses it does not address every circumstance and undoubtedly some are feeling hard done by. In a world of limited resources choices can be hard and difficult and will never please all.

So much has changed after Covid and the churches have not been immune. In the Lucan parishes, congregations have not returned to pre-covid levels. At a guesstimate I would put the attendance level at about 70% of what it used to be. Online Mass became the norm during the past two years and the habit/custom of Mass attendance disappeared from the way of life of many. The vulnerable elderly members of the congregation perhaps are still a little nervous of coming into close contact with large numbers in an enclosed space, although we do still offer hand sanitizers and urge the use of face masks.

It seems unlikely that things will go back to where we were. Covid may have passed but it's effects, in all kinds of ways, will be with us for many a long day.

The It Makes Sense loan

What is the 'It Makes Sense' loan?

The It Makes Sense loan (also known as the Personal Microcredit Scheme) is a small credit union loan at a low interest rate for people who are getting a social welfare payment. The scheme aims to reduce dependence on moneylenders that charge very high interest rates.

You can apply to borrow between €100 and €2,000. A maximum interest rate of 12% (12.74% APR) will apply.

If you are not a member of your local credit union, you can join and apply immediately for an It Makes Sense loan.

Who can apply?

You can apply for an It Makes Sense loan if you: Are aged over 18

Are getting a social welfare payment Agree to repay the loan through the Household Budget Scheme if you get your social welfare

payment at a post office

If your social welfare payment is paid into a bank or credit union account, you must repay the loan by standing order or direct debit. Check with your credit union whether it provides this option. You can apply for a loan for any purpose, including to repay an outstanding debt.

How to apply

You apply for an It Makes Sense loan through your credit union. If you are not a member, you will need to apply to join.

Not all credit unions take part in the scheme – view a list of participating credit unions where you can apply.

The scheme rules may differ between credit unions. For example, some credit unions may offer loans at lower amounts or ask a member to save for a certain amount of time before applying for a loan. Contact your credit union for details.

Joining the credit union

If you are not already a member of the credit union you will need to provide:

Proof of your identity – for example, a current passport or driving licence

Proof of your address – for example, a recent household bill or a recent document issued by a government department

Your PPS number

Applying for an It Makes Sense loan If you collect your weekly social welfare payment at the post office, when you apply for the loan you need to bring 2 consecutive social welfare slips (from within the previous 4 weeks).

If you get your social welfare payment into a bank or credit union account, you need to bring recent statements for the account. Check with the credit union how many statements you need to bring. Your local credit union can help you fill out a loan application form.

The credit union will decide whether to grant a loan and the amount of the loan

Repaying the loan

You must repay your loan each week from your social welfare payment through the Household Budget Scheme or, if your credit union agrees, by direct debit or standing order from your bank or credit union account.

The maximum deduction from your payment that is allowed under the Household Budget Scheme is 25% of your weekly social welfare payment. This includes any other deductions that you may already have under the Household Budget Scheme (for example, for rent or for household bills).

The maximum interest rate you will be charged for an It Makes Sense loan is 12% a year (12.74% APR).

After a long delay, LPC had a very high-handed negative response from the NTA saying no to all our proposals to solve bus problems arising from recent C-spine introductions, and persisting in treating people like parcels with three changes to get from Lucan to the Blanchardstown Hospital. This is in spite of the fact that Jack chambers TD in Blanchardstown intervened for us to try to extend the L52 into the hospital grounds like other buses. Consequently, as mandated by our public meetings, we have written this week to the Taoiseach, Minister for Transport, and Minister for Public Expenditure and have included them in our detailed response to the NTA on your behalf.

NTA refusal to acknowledge their mistakes has gone too far now and their suggestions regarding the former 25 route are completely impractical adding twenty minutes at least to the journey. Their attitude towards elderly and those with disabilities is truly appalling. If the NTA can't extend a route by one stop to a hospital, it begs the question what can they actually do with so much public money.

Further action will be taken and we will keep you informed.

1st vr news: A multi-denominational religious service was held in the school last Thursday for all 1st yr students. Fr. Ubaldo, who has kindly agreed to assist the school in a chaplaincy role where he will help look after the Christian values and ethos of Coláiste Phádraig, led a fully inclusive ceremony that was well received by all in attendance. Fr. Ubaldo will be involved in numerous other events with us throughout the school year and we are delighted to be able to avail of his time, expertise and guidance. He will help us strengthen the ethos and tradition of Edmund Rice, most notably the 5 key elements of the Edmund Rice Schools Trust Charter (ERST), nurturing faith and Gospel-based values, promoting partnership, excelling in teaching and learning, creating a caring school community and inspiring transformational leadership. The 5 key words representing each of the above are all on the front page of the school journal designed by current TY student Alex D'Alba which depicts a scene from the Edmund Rice iconography (a beautiful piece of art, like a stained glass, illustrating the life of Edmund Rice)

Transition Year: Our TY physics students took part in the Spaghetti and Marshmallow Tower Challenge last week. This is a STEM activity for beginners in design thinking to practice prototyping in testing. The students were given 20

small marshmallows, 20 pieces of spaghetti, 1 large marshmallow and 30cm of masking tape by their science teacher Ms. Smith. They had to work in teams to build the highest free-standing tower and the students took to the task with relish! They had a set time and the marshmallow had to be attached to the top of the structure. It was a great team-work exercise and the students learned how to work together and be creative, innovative and focused.

A couple of the structures were in danger of collapsing due to the weight of the marshmallow but the students managed to refine their efforts and create more stable and higher structures. Implementing new learnings and instant feedback from others into the next prototype is the essence of innovation so it was an educational and fun activity for the students involved. They learned a lot about the fundamental of physics such as stability, balance, weight, gravity and force. They were then able to relate some of these principles in a classroom discussion about Formula 1 racing.

Junior Cycle: An information night for parents of students in Junior Cycle was held in the school last Thursday. At this stage the new JC Programme it is fully implemented in all schools for all subjects so Ms. Redmond, our Junior Cycle Co-Ordinator, outlined for parents in attendance the ways in which the new JC programme differs from the old Junior Cycle. Primarily, the new Junior Cycle features newly developed subjects and short courses (such as Coding, CSPE and SPHE) with a focus on key skills and new approaches to teaching and learning, assessment and reporting that are very much student centred. The information night was extremely well attended with over 180 people there on the night and the feedback from parents was extremely positive so we thank Ms. Redmond for her informative and helpful presentation. Ms. Ryan was also in attendance liaising with the parents and answering any queries they had.

Parents Association: This year we are thankfully in a position to restart what was previously a vibrant and active Parents Association in the school after two years of restrictions. Barnardos Calls for a Dedicated Family Support Service in Lucan

Barnardos Children's Charity is calling for a dedicated family support service in Lucan. Established in 2015, Barnardos Lucan Family Support Servicewas set up a satellite service operating from a Ballyfermot location. Since 2015 the service has been funded by temporary funding from Tusla - the Child and Family Agency. The charity is now calling on the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth for a longer term funding commitment to fund a permanent Family support Service located in Lucan so children and families can avail of supports in their own area.

Since it's fruition 75 individuals from 25 families have benefited from the service. The charity revealed findings from an external evaluation at a recent event. The evaluation, which was carried out by Quality Matters and funded by the RTÉ Late Late Toy Show Appeal interviewed 18 participants, made up of parents, external stakeholders, staff members and children.

The findings were presented at a coffee morning in Adamstown Community Centre on Friday 23rd. The event was attended by members of the local community politicians and stakeholders.

Patricia Maguire Barnardos Project Leader said that due to the population growth in the area, the need for a dedicated service is more important than ever. 'The findings of the evaluation shows the positive impact of Barnardos Lucan Family Support Service. However, existing and future challenges exist around lack of permanent funding, increasing rate of social work referrals and rising demand for services. With additional

and more secure resources, Barnardos could reach more families living in Lucan who need help and support. Barnardos would like families living in the Lucan area to be able to directly access support from a project based in their own community.'

The Barnardos Lucan Family Support Service provides support to parents, children and families as a whole, to improve children's social and emotional wellbeing and development.

This week we have some more photographs from abroad. Josie took a very nice photograph of fishermen's huts when she was in Costa de la Luz in Spain and after his visit to Sardinia, Conor has moved on to Croatia, submitting a spectacular photograph of sunset in Lopud, Croatia in particular. Lopud is one of the Elafiti islands which is easily reached from Dubrovnik. He also submitted photographs of a Praying Mantis which, despite the name, is unlikely to hurt a human as it has no venom and cannot sting.





Nearer home when he was in Clifden Paddy found some interesting old advertising signs to photograph. I was particularly struck by one that advertised a particular brand of cigarettes and stated that the cigarettes in question "Will not affect your throat"! Another advertisement photographed was for the Railway Passengers Assurance Company apparently the first company established specifically to undertake accident insurance and which was in existence from 1849 to 2002. Clifden was the terminus of the Midland Great Western **Railway** branch line from Galway. Service commenced in 1895 and the last train pulled out from the station in 1935.
