As a consequence of retaining good records and photographs, we were able to form a PowerPoint presentation which was shown after each Mass last weekend.

From September companions can travel free with over 70s

Since 1 September 2025, if you are aged over 70 and have the Free Travel Scheme pass, you are entitled to a Free Travel Companion (FT+C) Public Services Card. This means someone who is over 16 can travel with you for free.

If you are aged 70 or over

If you are 70 or over and your current 'Personal' (FT-P) PSC or 'Spouse' (FT+S) PSC expires after 31 August 2025, a new PSC with FT+C (Free Travel Companion) on it will be sent to your home address. You don't need to apply.

If your PSC expired before 1 September 2025, you need to renew your PSC online on My

Welfare.ie or at a PSC Intreo Centre. A new PSC (FT+C) will be sent to your home address.



You can get the Free Travel Scheme if you are aged 66 and live permanently in Ireland. It allows you to travel, free of charge, on public transport and some private bus and ferry services.

How do I pay tax on my social welfare payment?

If you have a social welfare payment and another source of income, you may have to pay tax. In this case, your taxable social welfare payment and your other income are added together, and you are taxed on the total amount.

The Department of Social Protection does not take any tax from your social welfare payment before it is paid to you.



Social welfare payments

are taxed by reducing your tax credits and rate band. Your non-social welfare income determines how tax due is paid.

Example: If you are working or getting an occupational pension, and getting a social welfare pension

You are getting a social welfare pension and an occupational pension. Your occupational pension is taxed through the Pay-As-You-Earn (PAYE) system in the same way as a wage or salary. This means that you get your tax credits in the normal way.

To tax your social welfare pension, your annual tax credits are reduced by the tax liability on your social welfare pension. You pay tax on both pensions, but it is collected from the occupational pension. For higher incomes, the standard rate cut-off point will also be reduced. The technical term for this is 'coding in' of credits.

The same arrangement applies if you have income from a job and a social welfare payment. If your social welfare payment was not 'coded in', you would have to pay tax as a self-employed person and in a lump sum by 31 October each year.

Social security pensions from abroad

If you have a social security pension from abroad, it is also generally taxable in Ireland. The tax is payable annually, unless you have a source of income that is subject to PAYE.

Certain foreign pensions that would be exempt from tax if you were resident in the country paying the pension, are also exempt from tax in Ireland.

The service provides personal and practical support to patients and visitors attending St James's Hospital.



The Big River Watch Survey

Our rivers are far from healthy. They may be polluted with sewage, plastic, chemicals and nutrients. We need healthy rivers for wildlife, for our wellbeing, and to handle our changing climate. Whether you are an angler, a rambler, a wildlife spotter or someone who just likes to sit and observe, you can help our vital rivers.

As a community we need more information about how our local rivers are doing. You can help to identify and locate the problems which can then influence our local council and other agencies to take appropriate action.

You don't have to be an expert. All you need is a smartphone and less than half an hour to visit your local river. This is all you have to do.

- 1. Download the free BIG RIVER WATCH app from the Google or Apple Playstore.
- 2. Spend 15 minutes at a specific spot on your local river. Use the app to open the survey and record what you see, anything from wildlife to signs of pollution. The app has photos to help identify what you are likely to see.
- 3. When you are finished observing, complete the survey and upload it. The project objective is to record and map the health of the rivers all over Ireland.

If you live in Lucan the most appropriate rivers to observe are the Liffey, in Lucan Demesne and the Griffeen. The Griffeen is easily observable from any point from upper Griffeen Valley Park all the way downstream to Vesey Park.

The dates for recording the survey are from Friday September 19th to Thursday September 25th.

No Stone Left Unturned

Breaking news.

The government has announced the appointment of a junior minister to the newly formed Department of Stone Turning, Roinn Casadh Cloiche. His brief, to ensure that no Stone is left unturned.

A task force is being assembled to advance the initiative throughout the country. Teams of Stone turners will traverse the land. The public are to be incentivized to engage with the process. Grants will be made available to those who live in particularly stony areas and fines imposed on anyone on who's property stones are found unturned. The department will issue guidelines on how to differentiate between a stone and a small rock. Stone turning competitions will take place, the final to be held on Croagh Patrick on Stone turning bank holiday weekend. Ireland will become a World leader in the field of stone turning or indeed stone turning in the field. When no stone is left unturned the result will be transformative.

Public enquires and tribunals will be brought to a just and timely conclusion, criminal investigations expedited, with all perpetrators brought to book.

Legal and planning matters will proceed with haste, senior counsels will be seen playing cards in the law library. The Public Accounts Committee made redundant, RTE news reduced to fifteen minutes a day, Prime Time merging with the Late Late Show.

The cost of the initiative is estimated to come in somewhere in the region of a ballpark figure. A completion date for the project to become apparent going forward. The Minister will announce a commencement date when someone blameless can be found to turn the first stone.

Last week, the Art room was buzzing with energy as students began an exciting new portrait project introduced by the Art teacher, Ms. Carey. The new scheme of work focuses on celebrity-inspired Pop Art portraits, combining bold colours, abstract patterns, and tessellation techniques. Each student was given an A4 photograph of a well-known celebrity to use as a reference for their artwork. Among the chosen

faces were music icon Noel Gallagher and football star Cristiano Ronaldo, which sparked great interest and conversation among the students.

Using these photographs as guides, students began sketching and constructing their portraits, with a strong emphasis on Pop Art style — a movement known for its vibrant colour schemes, repetition, and use of popular culture imagery. To bring a modern twist, students were encouraged to incorporate abstract patterns and tessellations into the background or clothing in their compositions. Tessellations are created using shapes that fit together perfectly without any gaps, requiring careful planning and design.

The project not only builds on students' observational drawing skills but also allows them to experiment creatively with colour, shape, and design. The combination of structured technique and personal expression has been a hit with both groups of first years.

Ms. Carey has praised the creativity and enthusiasm shown across the two groups she has worked with so far, noting the individuality and imagination displayed in each student's approach. We look forward to seeing the completed portraits displayed around the school in the coming weeks — they are sure to be a colourful and eyecatching addition!

Well-being: At Coláiste Phádraig, we are proud to launch our new student-friendly version of the Bí Cineálta Policy to Prevent and Address Bullying Behaviour. This project was designed and created by students, under the guidance of Ms. Farrell. With great creativity commitment, three Transition Year students -Shane Clare, Nate Crawford and Troy O'Sullivan took on the task of designing and producing the student-friendly version of this policy. Shane Clare provided the striking artwork, which captures the stark reality of bullying. Nate Crawford contributed the powerful caption "Be Inclusive, Not Abusive", which forms the heart of the message. Troy O'Sullivan designed the creative layout which makes the policy accessible and eye-catching for all.

Shane, Nate, Troy along with Senan Walsh (also Transition Year) worked together to ensure the posters were displayed throughout the school, helping to make the message visible to everyone. The posters are now proudly displayed across our school as a daily reminder to all: **Be Inclusive**, **Not Abusive** — **and above all else**, **Be Kind**. They reflect our students' creativity and commitment to building a safe, respectful, and inclusive school culture.

A Flawed Consultation Undermining Lucan's Voice

Public consultation is one of the cornerstones of local democracy. When carried out properly, it gives communities a real say in shaping their environment and ensures public money is spent wisely. Unfortunately, the recent consultation on the proposed alterations to the Lucan Road Boardwalk demonstrates how the process can go badly wrong.

In February and March 2025, South Dublin County Council (SDCC) conducted an online survey on these proposed changes. At first glance, this looked like a genuine effort to seek community views. Yet a closer look reveals a process that was narrow, exclusionary, and ultimately misleading.

A Digital-Only Exercise

The consultation was promoted exclusively through SDCC's website. No effort was made to engage residents through local newspapers, radio, community leaflets, or direct contact with businesses. For a project that directly affects the daily lives of people in Lucan, this is wholly inadequate.

This online-only approach raises two problems. First, it excludes people who are less comfortable with digital platforms, particularly older residents. Only 11 of the 135 online respondents (just 8%) were aged over 65, despite this group representing a significant portion of Lucan's population. Second, it signals a worrying shift towards "digital discrimination"—where the ability to participate depends on online access and digital literacy rather than an equal right to be heard.

Survey Design That Blocked Objections

Even more concerning was the design of the survey itself. If a respondent answered "no" to the proposed changes, the survey would not allow them to continue or submit further comments. This structural flaw meant that objections could not be properly registered. In effect, only supportive responses were counted through the online channel.

Recognising this problem, many residents resorted to written submissions. Indeed, the scale of written feedback far outweighed the digital input:

- 135 survey responses (13.5%)
- 23 online portal submissions (2.5%)
- 854 written submissions (84%)

Dismissal of Written Feedback

Despite this overwhelming preference for written feedback, SDCC's report categorised the 854 submissions as "repetitive" or "lobbying in nature." Worse, it downplayed their relevance, suggesting they did not specifically address the boardwalk alterations. This is both unfair and inaccurate.

A Freedom of Information request allowed for a random review by myself of 200 written submissions. Not a single one expressed support for the proposed changes. It is therefore reasonable to conclude that 100% of written submissions opposed the alterations.

The Real Picture

When all submissions are taken into account, the numbers speak for themselves:

- 101 responses (10%) supported the changes
- 911 responses (90%) opposed them

This paints a starkly different picture from the Council's report, which emphasised that 71% of online survey respondents supported the changes. By focusing primarily on digital responses while sidelining written submissions, SDCC presented a distorted view of community opinion.

The Bigger Issues at Stake

This consultation raises fundamental questions about how public engagement is being handled:

- Why rely exclusively on digital channels to communicate with residents?
- Why restrict survey design so that objections could not be fully expressed?
- Why dismiss written submissions when they represented the overwhelming majority of feedback?

Such practices undermine trust in the consultation process. They also waste valuable public funds by pushing forward proposals that the community clearly does not support.

Most importantly, this approach disregards the voices of older residents, business owners, and families who rely on local parking and accessibility. This is not just poor practice—it is discrimination.

A Call for Fair Engagement and Accountability

Lucan deserves better. SDCC must re-commit to genuine, inclusive, and transparent consultation. That means:

- Running balanced information campaigns through multiple channels (radio, newspapers, community meetings, and leaflets).
- Allowing objections to be registered equally alongside support.
- Giving written submissions the same weight as digital ones.
- Respecting the voices of all age groups, particularly seniors who are often excluded by digital-only approaches.


Public consultation is not a box-ticking exercise. It is a duty of care to the community. If the Council wishes to alter the Grand Canal to Lucan Greenway Part 8 project, it must initiate a new **statutory** consultation process—one that respects every resident's right to participate, whether online or on paper.

And crucially, our local councillors and TDs must now step up and hold SDCC to account. They were elected to represent the people of Lucan, and they must ensure that the overwhelming opposition expressed by residents is not brushed aside. Councillors and TDs should insist that SDCC review all submissions fairly, correct the flaws in this consultation, and restore public confidence in the process.

The people of Lucan have spoken clearly. It is now time for SDCC—and those elected to represent us—to listen and act.

Age Friendly Homes and Housing Options for Older Homeowners:

I've had a lot of queries about housing options for older people. SDCC are developing 68 age-friendly apartments at Somerton (adjacent to Lucan Shopping Centre) due for completion in June 2026, and five more homes are underway in Sarsfield Park.

Private homeowners aged 55+ may apply via SDCC's Community List. This is a pathway to access age-friendly housing by either:

- Selling your home to the Council at an agerelated discount, or
- Selling privately and making a financial contribution from the proceeds.

This enables lifetime tenancy in high-quality, agefriendly housing. The scheme is designed to support older residents who wish to move to a home that better suits their needs as they age.

I've been engaging with residents, businesses and motorists about proposed changes outside Muintir Na Tíre/Lucan Village. The plan to widen the footpath and relocate the bus stop will reduce this road stretch to a single lane. Currently there are two lanes from Carroll's to the traffic light junction allowing smoother traffic flow. Under the new plan cars will queue behind stationary buses with the relocated stop in the single lane. Tailbacks will stretch through the village. Businesses welcome upgrades but delays already impact trade. Some report reduced footfall with customers pushed up the village toward the Liffey end.

While I support improvements like footpath upgrades, the bus stop relocation and road narrowing are wrong moves. We need pedestrian safety but without gridlock or harm to trade. I've secured an on-site meeting with SDCC engineers to push for a balanced, common-sense solution.
